SHORT SESSION ON SATURDAY

Legislature Discussed Canned Meats Act and Need of Inspection. How Island Exporters Are Handicapped And What May Be Done.

The House opened at 11.20 o'clock, Mr. Morson inquired for copies of contract and other papers in connection with the claim of Walter Lowe.

HON. MR. CUMMISKEY said that these papers were laid before the Legislature in 1898. He read the record of previous action of the House in regard thereto. In 1901 C. McLeod moved to refer the claim to a committee, of which he was chairman. The committee had reported the following year that Mr. Lowe had refused to submit evidence before the Committee.

MR. McLEAN said they had all been under the impression that under the act a slaughter house would be necessary. This is not so, if there is an inspection and the carcasses are dressed in the proper way. Hogs had only to be killed in a particular way to pass inspection.

HON. MR. McINNIS thought the farmers would prefer the old method of dressing pork. They had got the impression that they could not sell themselves do the killing and keep within the law.
