### A LAST APPEAL.

Every citizen who has the interest of the city at heart is urgently requested to be present at the citizens' meeting in Council Chamber this afternoon at four o'clock. The time has come for a last effort in the hotel question and definite action will be taken today. Citizens must realize the consequence of the present hotel situation and the great injury to the province should affairs continue as they are now existing. A number of our prominent men have interested themselves in the matter and everyone who can do anything to help the project by advice or financial assistance should be present at the meeting this afternoon.

The impossibility of erecting a new hotel of the better class in Charlottetown, even if the attempt were made in time for the summer's business, renders it desirable that the Hotel Davies shall be opened. Present hotel accommodation in the city is inadequate to house and care for the travelling public and the want will be the more felt as the season progresses, and especially when large gatherings are to be held and an exhibition little more than five months in the distance. Whether the Hotel be taken over by a company or an individual lessee does not matter very much provided the place is opened. But it must be distinctly understood that the new occupant shall keep the law. It is simply a bluff to claim that the sale of whiskey is necessary to make hotel keeping pay. There are many prosperous hotels on the Island, throughout Canada and elsewhere in which no intoxicants are sold.

## THE PUBLIC WORKS REPORT.

The Commissioner's annual report on the public works of Prince Edward Island gives a detailed statement of the expenditure during 1903 on public buildings, ferries, floats, ferry steamers, packets, wharves, roads, bridges, bushing ice and for miscellaneous public works, and also of the expenditure on miscellaneous public works and on capital account. It is due to Hon Mr Cumiskey to say that during his term of office he has kept the expenditure within the amount voted for his department, and also has avoided the necessity for any serious charge of maladministration. In both those respects few Ministers of Public Works have been equally fortunate, and none that we know of more so.

The report is in the usual form of past years. It might be improved by adding a recapitulation on one page of the amounts expended under the several principal heads.—From a cursory reading it would appear that \$35,970.57 was expended on public buildings, as follows: Government House..... \$ 230.05 Provincial Building..... 1,743.97 Prince of Wales College..... 2,142.01 Hospital for Insane..... 27,310.72 Court House, Charlottetown..... 1,370.88 " " Georgetown..... 381.04 County Court..... 536.37 Queen's County Jail..... 1,312.45 Prince " " and Court House..... 836.08 King's County Jail..... 147.72

Ferries, floats and ferry steamers cost \$18,311.38, of which \$2,236.43 was expended on the E. Co., \$1,300.99 on the Southport and \$8,873.96 on the Hillsboro. Packets were subsidised to the extent of \$3,285 and \$6,524.61 was spent on wharves. With the new bridge in operation across the harbor much of the expense on ferry steamers will be next year relieved.

Roads in Queens County absorbed \$8,023.22; in Prince County, \$7,091.72 and in Kings County \$6,712.46. Bridges in Queens called for \$7,212.96; in Prince \$4,325.73 and in Kings \$3,562.02. Bushing the ice caused an outlay of \$732.67.

The expenditure on capital account totalled \$11,575.93 of which \$4,484.39 was expended on public buildings, \$6,475.04 on bridges and \$616.50 on rights of way. Over \$3,000 of the total was spent on the Falconwood Asylum annex.

The report includes a list of the Public Works contracts entered into during the year amounting to \$36,123.81. The amount paid on contracts during the year was \$32,569.30 and the balance due on the contracts of 1903 is set down as \$3,524.54

### AN EXHIBITION GRANT.

We are pleased to find that the Provincial Government favor a grant for an Exhibition to be held in this city next autumn and that therefore we may speak of the fall fair as a coming event. In fact we are informed by Secretary Smallwood that the date has been already fixed to begin on Tuesday September 27th and to run for four days. It is hoped that by this early announcement any conflict of dates between our Exhibition and those of other Maritime Provinces such as have caused trouble and loss in the past may be avoided. It is needless to argue the benefits of competitive shows of the country's products. The advantages are conceded in all civilized countries. The majority of our people desire an exhibition and they are to have it. We trust that with the timely notice thus given all intending exhibitors will make due preparation and do their best to make it abundantly successful.

The prize list will be placed in the printer's hands within the next few days, and therefore intending exhibitors who have any suggestions of desirable changes to make should lose no time in communicating with the Secretary.
