PROHIBITION IN ALBERTA

Monster Petition is Submitted to Legislature.
EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 16.—A delegation of 15 persons waited on the Government of Alberta in the Legislative Assembly room at noon, presenting a petition signed by 23,000 qualified electors asking for a vote upon the total prohibition of the liquor traffic in the province. H. N. Stevens of Vermillion, introduced the delegation. He stated that seven per cent more than the required number of electors' signatures were on this monster petition. If the measure is defeated in the Legislature it will have to be submitted to the Electorate in the form of a referendum and the temperance forces ask that the first Tuesday in June of 1915 be chosen as the day for voting.

BOER LEADERS MAY BE FREE OF REBEL OT

Mention of Names by Traitorous Colonel Intended to Involve Them.
STANDING BY GOVERNMENT.
Discovery of Plot is Producing Fresh Wave of Enthusiasm for Botha and His Policy.
CAPE TOWN, Oct. 13.—(Despatch to the London Morning Post.)—Col. Maritz' ultimatum, containing reference to Generals Hertzog, Beyers and De Wet, does not necessarily mean that these leaders are implicated in the plot. It may have been an attempt to drag them in. General Beyers alone is generally mistrusted. The general indications are that the Maritz revolt and the prompt action of the Government are producing a fresh wave of enthusiasm for General Botha personally and for the policy. In view of the mischievous influence of certain Hertzogite preachers, there is a special reason for fortification in a letter from Rev. A. I. Steyler, moderator of the Dutch Reformed Church, who speaks with enthusiastic approval of the attitude of General Botha and the Government, and declares that the action of Beyers is incomprehensible.
Retz, president of the Senate and ex-president of the Free State, interviewed by the Cape Times, said: "Maritz must be mad," and confirmed the view that Generals Hertzog, Beyers, Kemp, and Miller were not in the plot, but that Maritz desired to involve them. Retz said: "I know all of them personally, some of them intimately. I don't for a moment believe any one of them either knew Maritz' intention or would approve what he has done."
Hopes are entertained for the success of the appeal of leading Cape Town Afrikaners to ex-President Steyn whose influence is paramount among the Afrikaners. It says that Maritz has been canvassing chiefly for support.
Ons Land in a vigorous article calling for enthusiastic support of the Government, describes Maritz' conduct as unheard of and most humiliating to Afrikaners. It says that mention by Maritz of five Boer generals places them in a most unenviable position. "People have the right to expect them to make declaration immediately and publicly that they have had nothing to do with the rebellion and revolt."

TO PUNISH REBELS.

LONDON, October 13.—The Official Press Bureau today issued the text of a telegram received by the Secretary of the Colonies from the Governor-General of South Africa, which was as follows.
"Ever since the resignation of General Beyers as commandant-general of the Citizens' Force, there have been indications that something was wrong with the forces in the North-west Cape province which were placed under command of Lieutenant-Colonel S. G. Maritz.
"The Government at once arranged to send Colonel Conrad Brits to take over the command from Lieutenant-Colonel Maritz. On October 8 Colonel Brits sent a message to Colonel Maritz to come in and report to him. To this message Colonel Maritz replied in a most insolent manner that he was not going to report to anybody. All he wanted was his discharge and Colonel Brits must come himself and

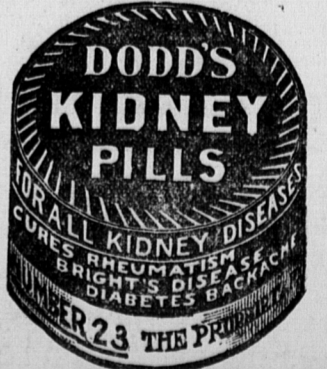

SHART SHRIFT FOR MARITZ.

LONDON, October 13.—In itself the action of Colonel Maritz is not regarded as of serious importance. His following is small and his force is situated in a district where it can be of least value to the Germans in South-West Africa. Maritz has always been known to be irreconcilable and was certain to seize any opportunity for making trouble. It is assumed that Premier Botha will lose no time in having him arrested.
A man well acquainted with South African affairs says that General Botha was probably very glad of the opportunity to proclaim martial law, as it would enable him to take measures which ordinary law would not permit. "It is a mistake to judge South African affairs by English standards," said the authority. "Their methods are much more rough and ready and Botha will lose no time in taking measures to squelch Maritz and his followers."
"Hertzog has nothing to do with this affair, and one result of the Maritz incident will be to drive wavering Boer ranks and give a great stimulus to recruiting. Botha can get ten thousand men to Umpington, where Maritz is, in a very short time, and if I do not mistake the Boers of the black veil, they will not only not sympathize with Maritz, but will give him the shortest shrift."
Major Bouwer saw an agreement between Colonel Maritz and the Governor of German Southwest Africa, guaranteeing the independence of the Union as a republic, ceding Wal-fish Bay and certain other portions of the Union to Germans and undertaking that the Germans only would invade the Union on the invitation of Col. Maritz.
"Major Bouwer was shown numerous telegrams and hello-messages dating back to the beginning of September. Colonel Maritz boasted that he had ample guns, rifles, ammunition and money from the Germans and that he would overrun the whole of South Africa.
The Government is taking the most vigorous steps to stamp out the rebellion and to inflict condign punishment on all rebels and traitors.
"A proclamation declaring martial law throughout the Union, will appear in a Gazette extraordinary today, Monday, October 12, 1914.
(Signed) BUXTON,
Governor-General of S. Africa."
