RECORD OF PERFORMANCE FOR POULTRY

Entries for the Record of Performance for Poultry conducted by the Dominion Live Stock Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, have just closed and a total of 15,235 birds will be trap-nested on breeders own plants during the 1923-24 laying season.

This is a considerable increase over the 12,286 birds entered last year, and is significant of the interest which has been aroused in pedigree breeding work. The birds entered are representative of the poultry flocks of 184 breeders in all parts of the Dominion.

Each province in the Dominion is represented in this work though British Columbia is well ahead, 8,156 or 53% of the birds entered being from that province. Ontario is second with 3,252 or 21.3%, Quebec third with 1,267 or 8.3%, and Alberta next with 1,235 or 8.1%. The standing of breeders by provinces is in the same order.

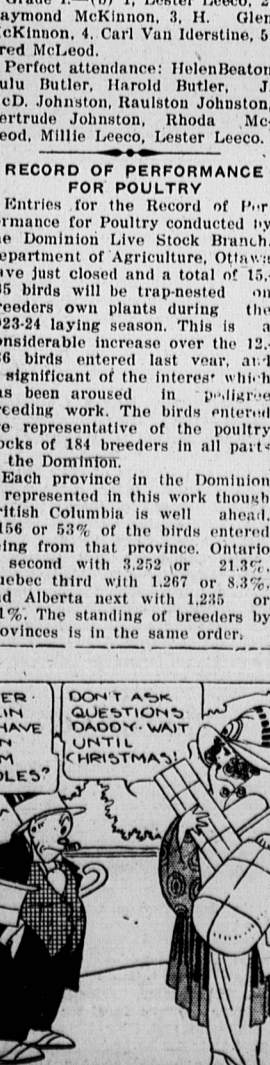
ATTRACTIVE WINDOW

BRINGING UP FATHER



Birds that lay 150 eggs in 52 consecutive weeks are entitled to Record of Performance certificates, while those laying 225 or over are awarded Advanced Record of Performance certificates. It is necessary, however, for the birds themselves to be of standard variety and free from standard disqualifications, and for their eggs to average at least 2 ozs. each. The breeder keeps his own records, and these are checked from time to time by Inspectors of the Dominion Department of Agriculture who make unannounced periodic visits to call the entrants. An annual report of this work is published, and may be obtained on application to the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa, Ontario.
