Former Champion Accepts Challenge

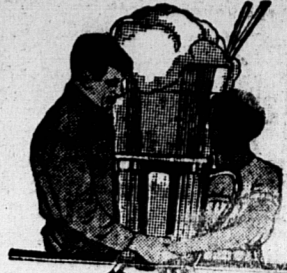
CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Art Staff, former international champion indoor and outdoor skater, has accepted a challenge from Everett McGovern of St. Paul, now national champion skater, for a series of races leading up to a contest for the international title. McGovern also named Edmund Lamy, of Saranac Lake, N. Y., in the challenge. The races including events over five distances will be held at St. Paul about the first week of February, it was decided. Unless the weather turns cold, Art Staff said he would remain up north for a week or ten days.

Death of Mr. Charles E. Simmons

The death occurred in this city on Sunday afternoon the 9th inst. of Mr. Charles Simmons, after a lingering and painful illness which he bore with extraordinary patience. Born in Halifax he entered the service of the Nova Scotia Railway after the eastern division of the Intercolonial learning his trade as a painter. He later moved to Moncton in the employ of the Intercolonial and resided there a number of years when he was transferred to P. E. Island to become Foreman Painter in the railway shops here. He remained in Charlottetown until 1914 when he retired on the Superannuation fund and removed to Halifax where he expected a very comfortable cottage not far from the spot where he was born, and had just settled down to enjoy the remainder of his days after a service of 52 years of faithful service in the railway employ, when the explosion took place which destroyed his little home and seriously injured himself and his wife and compelled them both to submit to a long treatment in the different hospitals. His home being about half a mile from the scene of the explosion and in the middle of the path in which the greatest amount of damage was done, all that was left of it was about enough to light a kitchen fire. After undergoing all the treatment that it was possible to do at Halifax Mr. Simmons again removed to Charlottetown and purchased a home at 288 Grafton Street, where he resided till his death. The late Mr. Simmons was a man who enjoyed great popularity among his acquaintances, and was noted for his gentility. As a tradesman he had no equal in this part of the Dominion as his knowledge of all parts of his trade was the result of careful study not given by most mechanics. He is survived by his widow, and one son Charles who resides in Boston, but who fortunately got home in time to be at his father's bedside at the last; also one brother who resides in Taunton, Mass. To the grief stricken relatives is extended deepest sympathy. The funeral takes place from his late residence 288 Grafton St. on Tuesday at 3 p. m., service beginning at 2.30 to Sherwood Cemetery (Halifax papers please copy)
