**ANOTHER JUNIOR RED CROSS YEAR SUCCESSFULLY CONCLUDED**

**WHEN THE COMMITTEE WAS FORMED THE PREMIER MINISTER PLEADED THAT SOLDIERS LEGISLATION BE KEPT OUT OF POLITICS.**

When its work was before Parliament the Minister in charge, the Liberal Chairman and others commended the work of the committee, its cooperative efforts and non-partisanship.

**AROUSED KEEN RESENTMENT**

That Premier King and more especially his Minister of Trade and Commerce, Hon. James Malcolm should seek to make political capital out of the soldiers' legislation has aroused keen resentment not only in the Conservative party but even more strongly among war veterans of all political affiliations.

There were nineteen members of the committee and of these eleven had served overseas. OF THESE SEVEN WERE CONSERVATIVES: COLONEL ARTHURS, CAPTAIN GEORGE BLACK, GENERAL CLARK, DR. MCGIBBON, DR. MACLAREN, DR. MANION AND GENERAL ROSS; and four Liberals: Major Power, Captain Hepburn, Captain Sanderson, and Captain Thorson.

Colonel Ralston Minister of National Defence was in England and had nothing to do with the report.

**THE PERSONNEL OF THE COMMITTEE IS EVIDENCE OF WHO EFFECTED THE LEGISLATION. ITS REPORT WAS UNANIMOUS AND WAS UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED IN BOTH COMMONS AND SENATE.**

**Political Chicanery**

No sooner was the election announced than Premier King sought to make political capital where he had pleaded there be no partisanship. At Brantford, speaking on soldiers legislation, he said it was the present administration that took full responsibility in the matter. But even he was modest in his claims compared with Hon. James Malcolm, who sponsored advertisements in Ontario newspapers in which he claimed all the credit for the Government and urged support of a Government that has kept faith with the returned soldier.

Mr. Malcolm was not even a member of the committee!

**CONSERVATIVE AMENDMENT VOTED DOWN**

Now that the Government has made the soldiers treatment a political issue, the truth can be told. The present Government, constituted as it was, could never of itself have done justice to the soldier. IT WAS THE DEMANDS OF THE SOLDIERS' LEGION, BACKED BY THE FULL STRENGTH OF THE CONSERVATIVE PARLIAMENTARY PARTY, THAT FORCED GOVERNMENT ACTION. IN 1927 HON. F. B. BENNETT MOVED A SERIES OF AMENDMENTS TO THE PENSIONS ACT REMOVING THE ONUS OF PROOF OF DISABILITY FROM THE SOLDIERS AND GENERALLY BROADENING THE APPLICATION OF THE ACT FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE SOLDIER. THESE WERE ALL REJECTED BY THE GOVERNMENT WITH THE LIBERAL MEMBERS VOTING AGAINST THEM.

**FORCES GOVERNMENT ACTION**

Last November Sir Arthur Currie, writing to the Canadian Legion meeting in Regina, demanded a revision of the pensions act in the interests of the soldier. So widespread was the demand that the government was forced to take some action and in the speech from the Throne last session a promise was given to do so.

Before any government action was taken, Peter McGibbon, Muskoka, in a resolution demanded the Government amend the Pensions Act so as to lift the onus of proof of disability from the veteran. For days CONSERVATIVES URGED THAT THIS BE DONE, and finally, to shut off the debate Hon. Dr. King brought down the Government's pension legislation.

What was it? How far did it meet the demands of the Canadian Legion and the Conservative members? Fortunately the extent of the Government's legislation is recorded in Hansard. It was simply the war veterans allowance, which gives old age pensions to veterans at 60 years instead of 70 years, as is the case with the general public. THERE WAS NOTHING ABOUT THE REVISION OF THE PENSIONS ACT. Here is the proof from Hansard, fortunately recorded when the War Veterans Allowances Act was introduced by Hon. Dr. King:

"GENERAL CLARK: Is this matter to be referred to the Committee appointed last evening by the House?"

"DR. KING: Yes it is to be referred to that Committee."

"GENERAL CLARK: Is the major matter to be brought before that Committee?"

"DR. KING: I should say it was."

"GENERAL CLARK: Is there to be any other specific matter referred to that Committee?"

"DR. KING: You mean a Government Bill?"

"GENERAL CLARK: Yes."

"DR. KING: No."

After being compelled to give an opportunity to secure justice for the soldiers, the Government and particularly Hon. James Malcolm are now saying in effect to the Veterans: "See what we, your friends, did for you."
