PROHIBITION COURT—Magistrate Darby held court at Alberton on Tuesday when several prohibition cases were dealt with, besides some excise cases. A case against a man from Nail Pond, charged with selling liquor illegally, was the first on the docket. The man was found guilty and fined \$200.00 and costs or 3 months. A similar case against a woman from Bloomfield was heard and adjourned for one week. Three trunks from O'Leary pleaded not guilty. Their hearing was adjourned for one week to secure witnesses. Another party from O'Leary charged with consuming pleaded guilty and was fined ten dollars or ten days. A man from Tignish charged with an offence against the excise act was found guilty and fined \$50.00 and costs. A man from Portune Cove brought up on a similar charge was also fined \$25.00 and costs. Judgment was delivered in the case against Henry Richards of Tignish, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit an indictable offence. The case was dismissed on the grounds of insufficient evidence. On Monday at Summerside a woman came before Magistrate Darby charged with the unlawful manufacture of beer. The woman was found guilty and fined \$25.00 and costs.

Meeting Of Children's Aid Society

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Prince County was held Tuesday night in the Town Building, Summerside. The President, Dr. J.A. MacPhee, presided, and there was a fair attendance. The Agent, Louis Wedge, reported that one boy had been taken to St. Patrick's Home in Halifax. He said he had at present on Probation six boys ranging in age from nine to thirteen years and he was trying to get a room in which he could give these probationers Scout work two evenings of every week, and he felt that so doing, something might be achieved that would be a help to these boys. He also reported that he had made an appeal for second-hand clothing through the press, and the response was very good and he was able to fit out six pupils so that they could attend school, and he also purchased a little new clothing with the Society's funds. But he had still some children out of school from lack of clothing and he felt that more second-hand clothing might be obtained if citizens would make an extra effort to look same up. He would call at any house for second-hand clothing if word was left for him at the Town Office. Three boys had been up before the Juvenile Court for stealing a bag of junk which the owner had left outside a Blacksmith Shop while he was transacting some business with the owner of the shop. The boys had been put on probation. The Society was advised that the Town authorities were making some provision to prevent junk-dealers buying junk from small boys. The Trust-officer reported that he had three trunks for the month and a number of pupils had been home with sickness. S.

Recital By Pupils St. Mary's Convent

The pupils of St. Mary's Convent, Summerside, gave a splendid piano recital on Tuesday evening which was a credit to the pupils and also their teacher.
Each piece was played from memory and from the youngest little tot to the oldest and more experienced players there was not a faltering note.
It is hardly fair to single any particular pupil out for special mention, but the performance of Miss Mallinson who is only sixteen years of age, was without a doubt the most outstanding of the older pupils. Her rendition of Liszt, "Hungarian Rhapsody" played from memory was simply marvelous. Miss Mallinson has a deep touch and light fingering and plays with expression and meaning not often found in so young a pupil.
The misses F. and L. Gallant, Mary Silliphant and the Misses MacPhee and Miss MacNeill also in the senior groups, need no introduction to a Summerside audience, playing their pieces with beautiful expression.
Of the younger pupils, perhaps Miss Downing, Miss Callaghan and the Misses Silliphant were worthy of special mention, each showing great promise in their ease in playing most difficult pieces.
"Return of the Reapers" by Miss Kelly was very delightful. Some charming songs made a pleasant interlude to the instrumental music.
Rt. Rev. Mgr. MacLellan, V. G., in complimenting the pupils, expressed the hope that they would all strive to become accomplished pianists, which he felt sure they would be if they continued in their efforts as tonight's performance showed they were capable of doing. He made special mention of Miss Mallinson's performance.
