NEWCASTLE, Shropshire, England - (CP) - A man wheeled a bicycle into Newcastle police headquarters and vanished. Attached to the bicycle was a note reading: "Please return this bike to Oxford University. Borrowed it."

The "Happy Warrior" is pictured as one who is determined "to make his moral being his prime care" who turns his necessity to glorious gain. He is trying to be sufficient in himself. His ambition is not so much to overtake others, to emulate their lot, as to surpass the self that he was yesterday. Not so much to keep up a flying ideal, a task that will occupy all his time.

John Morley said that "the great business of life is to be, to do, to do without, and to depart."

There is a certain saying that we often use when some people are described. Oh, we say they are trying to "keep up with the Joneses" and when we hear that we instinctively say to ourselves: "well they have little originality because they so readily take their cue from others."

Each one in this world is expected to make some contribution to life, for he or she is a unique individual. The old bishop in Browning's poem, when he is addressing the young and flippant newspaper man, says: "best be thyself, imperial, plain and true."

There is an old saying that "imitation is the surest form of flattery." If we copy others, the implication is that we see something in them that we would like to possess. We emulate them.

Now Saint Paul in giving a list of the sins of the flesh when he is writing to the people of Galatia names "emulation" among them. And the company in which it is found is not flattery while it is called a sin of the flesh it is really a sin of the spirit. Dante puts farther down in hell the sins of the flesh. However, while emulation begins in the mind, the idea is worked out in the flesh, and the result may be often very cruel.

What is it that we emulate in others as a rule? Most certainly it is not their intellectual gifts nor their artistic or their moral graces, but most likely what Jesus called the "abundance of the things in which so many think that life consists. It may be the clothes they wear. Vanity thinks if it can dress like such a one they are in the same class forthwith. It may be the house they live in, or the general scheme of their life. In many cases it is the accidentals that we crave - what Epicurus would call the "appearances," not the reality.

To be moderate is to say that such conduct is foolish, and indicates how superficial life may become.

The Joneses may be able to afford things to which I am unable to pretend, and I am wise to acknowledge my limitations - "accepting the universe" as some one was once advised to do. Trying to keep up with the Joneses is the cause of all kinds of trouble. Much of the financial worry is to be laid at the financial door would be broken up by this too. Envy, that greyney monster is a close cousin of emulation. They together have done infinite mischief to people. We have gone past homes and a fitting writing above the untrudered door would be "They tried to keep up with the Joneses."

Puck, in "A Midsummer Night's Dream," makes this remark: "Lord, what fools these mortals be!" How true when applied to the situation of which I write. Variety is the spice of life, and what folly I think that we need to be like others. I heard once, in a time when money was plentiful as it has been recently of a working man who was vain enough to buy a thousand dollar fur coat, thinking that if his wife were only thus clad she would be in the same class as the man whose income would easily stand that expense. Burns had the right idea when he wrote
