OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—The Supreme Court of Canada in a judgment handed down today held that claims for Dominion taxes had priority over claims for Provincial taxes.

American Craft Destroyed Off Liverpool Port

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 27.—Almost exhausted and wet to the skin despite his heavy oilskins, Captain MacNeill arrived at Liverpool at 12:30 this morning and told of the destruction of the eight-ton American schooner-yacht Shagwang off Liverpool Harbor at 5:30 Thursday afternoon.

The action arose out of a bankruptcy matter. Both the Dominion Government and the Quebec authorities had claim against the bankrupt for taxes. There was not sufficient to pay both claims in full. It then became a question as to which claim took priority.

The trustee in bankruptcy in his dividend sheet gave priority to the claim of the Dominion and in that he was sustained by the trial judge, Mr. Justice Panneton. The court of Kings Bench held, Mr. Justice Guerin dissenting, that both claims rank concurrently. From that decision, the Dominion appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

MCDONALD WAS DEPORTED AS UNDESIRABLE

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The New York Times today publishes the following special cable from London: Ramsay MacDonald, now British Prime Minister, was deported from Belgium as "undesirable" in the autumn of 1914, and one of the officers who issued the order is now Governor of an Australian state.

This story is told for the first time in a new biography, "J. Ramsay MacDonald: Labor's Man of Destiny," by H. Hessel Tiltman, which will be published here on Friday. It reveals that Mr. MacDonald volunteered with the ambulance unit in the earliest days of the war, and displayed great courage under heavy shell fire.

When the war broke out, according to Mr. Tiltman's story, Mr. MacDonald went to Belgium to join Dr. Hector Monroe's ambulance unit, then attached to the Belgian army at Furnes. He was then a Labor member of parliament, and volunteered on account of his "intense feeling for the victims of the war."

One night when Dr. Monroe returned to his headquarters, Mr. MacDonald could not be found. This is how Mr. Tiltman tells the story: "Inquiries elicited the fact that he had been arrested by a Belgian general under instructions from the British authorities. The excuse given for this official blunder was that his passport was not in order. The real reason was that the higher British officials on the spot—one of whom is today governor of an important state within the Empire—considered him an undesirable person to be allowed to serve on the western front in any capacity."

Mr. MacDonald was shipped back to England, but as soon as Lord Kitchener heard of the incident he was extremely angry. He issued a "redominibus" pass to British headquarters, and the future Prime Minister went back to Belgium at once and resumed his ambulance work.

When We Have Candor In Marriage Dorothy Dix Says There Will Be No Marriage

If the Younger Generation Ever Achieves Its Ambition of Perfect Candor Before and After Marriage, What Few Marriages Come Off Will Inevitably End in Divorce, Says Dorothy Dix

A Flapper has been explaining to me the code of the younger generation in dealing with the opposite sex. "You see," she said, "we are absolutely frank and honest with each other. There is no hypocrisy. We say exactly what we think, whether others like it or not. We don't hand out any blah and boloney, as the older generation of men and women used to do to each other."

"Now, if I don't like the way a boy dresses, I tell him so, and ask him why he doesn't get some Klassy Kut Kollege Klothes instead of the hand-me-downs he is wearing. If a boy lacks pep, I don't pretend to him that I think he is a sheik. I let him know I consider him a flat tire. If a boy is a repeater who tells the same thing over and over again, I say: 'Can it; kid. It's old stuff and it slays me.'"

"And when we of the younger generation get married we will be perfectly honest and frank with our husbands and wives. There won't be any of this yes-yessing each other and pussyfooting it around the angels of each other's dispositions in order to get along together. We will come out with the naked truth and the other one can lump it or leave it."

"Why, when I see how my mother jollies my father along and how she makes the gesture of deferring to his opinions when she knows perfectly well she is going to do her own way, anyhow, it makes me actually sick. Why, she uses up enough tact and diplomacy in managing father to run the whole League of Nations, and then have so me left over. None of that domestic camouflaging for me! When I get married I shall tell my husband plainly that I have his number, and just where he gets on and gets off, and I shall expect him to be equally honest with me."

"Ah," I said, "I perceive, then, that in the future when you of the younger generation begin to put your matrimonial theories into practice, divorce will not only be common, it will be universal. That is, of course, if any of you get married. For Truthful James is no understudy to Cupid, nor is Veracious Jane any man's ideal of a Lady Love. Courtship is not founded on candor. It is constructed on a basis of make-believe."

"Somehow I cannot visualize a man ever popping the question to a girl who tells him to his face of his faults and weaknesses and does not conceal from him that she considers him a good deal of a dud, and that he isn't within a million miles of being the hero of her dreams."

"Nor can I imagine any man deliberately letting himself in for a lifetime of the society of a woman who warns him before marriage that she is generally to censor his morals and his manners and his conduct and make him generally conform to her ideals of what a husband should be and that his days of freedom will end at the altar."

"Nor can I figure a girl saying 'Yes' to a man who says: 'Sally, you are certainly no treat to the eyes to look at, and sometimes when I listen to your conversation I wonder if your mother didn't drop you on your head when you were a baby. Also, I am a little leery of your temper, but you are healthy and strong, and we should be able to pull it off with not more than the average amount of scrape, and, of course, there is always the divorce court, so will you marry me?'"

"Believe me, there would be very few marriages if courtship was conducted on a basis of absolute frankness, because no woman wants a close-up of how she looks to her lover, nor does any man desire to know just exactly what his sweetheart thinks of him. The girl wants the man to draw a fancy picture of an angelic creature that she thinks that he thinks she is, and he prefers to believe that he has her fooled into believing him a godling."

"And if absolute candor between a man and woman is dangerous before marriage, it is fatal after marriage. No husband or wife could survive the shock of being brutally told the disillusionments that the close contact of the holy estate has brought to the other. A timed bomb under the doorstep would not be more sure to blow a home to Kingdom Come than utter frankness around the hearthstone."

"As a matter of fact, we have all seen it tried out with disastrous results. We all know husbands who do not scruple to tell their wives that they are morons who don't know what they are talking about when they express an opinion. Husbands who remark when the bread is heavy and opine that any idiot should be able to learn how to cook. Husbands who remark on how fat and homely their wives have got. Husbands who even tell their wives that they don't know why they married them."

"And we know wives who are equally truthful with their husbands. Wives who make no bones of letting their husbands see that they bore them. Wives who tell their husbands that they consider ten failures because they don't make more money. Wives who deride their husband's judgment and criticize everything they do and say and wear."

"And these couples invariably live in strife, or else take their candid opinion of each other to the divorce courts and get a decree on the grounds of mental cruelty on the strength of it. The happy, peaceful homes in which husbands and wives keep their affection to the end are invariably those in which husbands and wives jolly each other along and handle unpleasant truths as if they were dynamite."

"As a matter of fact, there can never be entire honesty and frankness between the sexes. Neither one wants it. Each likes to think the other sees it with a halo about it and when you strip this off there is nothing left but a poor, faulty man and woman who have no allure for each other and who avoid each other for fear of having their vanities stabbed in a vital place." Blond Oily Hair

Dear Miss Leeds: (1) I have blond hair that is getting darker and is very oily. What can I use to bleach it and take away the oiliness? (2) I am 5 feet 3 1/2 inches tall and weigh 118 pounds. Am I too stout? (3) I have a fair skin and blue eyes. What colors are becoming?

BLUE EYES.

Answer—(1) Shampoo your hair once a week with an olive oil shampoo soap in liquid form. Lather and rinse your hair six separate times. After all the soap has been rinsed out you may apply a bond rinse evenly all over your hair. Such a rinse may be made of two tablespoonfuls peroxide, one teaspoonful ammonia and a quart of water. Leave the mixture on for ten minutes and then rinse it all off in clear water.

If your hair becomes very oily between your weekly shampoos you apply to your scalp the following astringent: four (4) ounces cologne water; one (1) ounce white bay rum; one-half (1/2) dram spirit of rosemary. (2) Your weight is correct if you are 16 years of age or thereabout. The average weight for that height at 18 years of age is between 119 and 123 pounds. You are not too stout. (3) You may wear dainty pastel shades in pink, blue, and the neutral tans, beige, tan and sand shades are becoming. Of course blue is the obvious choice for your type. You may wear Holland, Wedgewood, cadet, sapphire, greenish blues and bright navy. Among the greens choose pale shades, almond and deep blue-green. Black is good for contrast. Flesh, old rose, gray, orchid, blue-violet, cream and Burgundy are good. LOIS LEEDS.

Shampoo for Oily Hair

Dear Miss Leeds—Once a week does not seem often enough to wash my hair since it is very oily. Please suggest a good shampoo for me to use. HENRIETTA K.

Answer—A good shampoo mixture for oily hair may be made of two (2) ounces tincture of green soap, two (2) ounces alcohol or bay rum and one-half (1/2) ounce tincture of rosemary. Lather and rinse your hair several times before the final rinse. Excessive oiliness of the hair is sometimes due to nervousness and a run-down physical condition, and in such cases may be corrected by improving one's general health. LOIS LEEDS.

Removing Tartar

Dear Miss Leeds—I have tartar on the back of my teeth. Is there a way to remove it without going to the dentist? ANNE L.

Answer—There are preparations sold for dissolving tartar but it is unwise to use them as they are likely to injure the teeth. The best way is to have a dentist remove the deposits regularly once or twice a year. LOIS LEEDS.

Recipe for Graying Hair

Dear Miss Leeds—Sometime ago you published a recipe for graying hair. I used it and found it very good but I lost the recipe. Please print it again. ELLINOR F.

Answer—I am not sure just what recipe you have in mind but here is one for a stimulating scalp tonic: 1 dram tincture cinchona; 1 dram tincture rosemary; 1 dram tincture cantharides; 3 ounces castor oil; 10 ounces bay rum. If this is not the recipe you had before, perhaps you can remember some of its ingredients which would give me a clue to the particular recipe you want. LOIS LEEDS.
