Mrs. S. L. Partington, Grand Worthy Patriarch of Maine who was pleased to convey greetings from the Grand Division of her jurisdiction and also the greetings of our Brother the Parson-Shreff Pearson, who has proved himself since taking office a terror to violators of the Maine Liquor Law. Mr. Pearson is a Minister of the Gospel, is also a Son of Temperance and so bold and fearless in the discharge of his duties is he, that the liquor men, solicitous for his health have again and again urged him to accept of \$400 and take an European tour for his health sake. Needless to say the kind offer has never been accepted by our Brother, who cannot be bought at any price to violate his principles. On motion of Rev. Alfred Noon it was resolved that the greetings of this National Division in annual session assembled be conveyed by Mrs. Partington to our Brother Pearson, assuring him of our sympathy and wishing him God Speed in his loved work.

At the conclusion of the program the circle of fraternity was formed, all joining with clasped hands in singing "God be with you till we meet again" and our own closing ode, "Once more we here the pledge renew."



S. S. LESSON.

JULY 14. BEGINNING OF SIN AND REDEMPTION.

Gen. 3, 1-25. Memory verses, 14, 15. GOLDEN TEXT. Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound.—Rom. 5, 20.

OUTLINE. 1. Temptation, v. 1-5. 2. Sin, v. 6. 3. Conscience and Excuses, v. 7-13. 4. Judgement, v. 14. 5. Promise, v. 15.

LESSON HELPS.

1. "The serpent was more subtle"—The serpent, as well as every other creature God hath made, was pronounced good. Gen. 1, 25. It was not subtle in any bad sense of the word, but more prudent. The serpent has a keen eye, power to charm birds, is very cautious, and seeks to protect its head from attack. "And he said unto the woman" Different views of this passage, but the clearest and most generally received is that the evil spirit Satan entered the serpent, and so spoke. There is a mystery about evil spirits entering bodily forms, but the fact remains to those who accept the Scriptures.

2, 3. "And the woman said"—In reply to the insinuation of the tempter, which was a false one. Not all the trees were forbidden, but only one. It was a mistake for the woman to talk with the serpent, but it came from ignorance of the evil spirit dwelling there. "Ye shall not eat of it"—The woman's addition to the command, and perhaps she thought it was too severe.

4. "Ye shall not surely die"—Here the tempter reveals his true nature as the father of lies. He was cautious at first, but as the woman wavered he grew bold. He knew better, for he was wise and had experience of the nature of sin. In an evil nature there is a love of a lie, and the crooked path is preferred to the straight one.

5. "Your eyes shall be opened"—Truth and error are mixed, and a lie which has some truth in it is most dangerous for it is plausible. What avails it to know all evil by bitter experience? "Ye shall be as gods"—Rather, as God. A false and absurd suggestion. One may know something of evil by sinning, but that does not give one all knowledge. God is both all wise and all good. Satan tried to make Eve discontented and also ambitious beyond the bounds of right.

6. "Saw that the tree was good"—True, the tree was good, but it was forbidden, and the command of God should have been heeded. "Pleasant to the eyes"—Much evil enters through the eye which kiddles an evil imagination. "To make one wise"—Notice the threefold form of this first temptation. First, the appeal to the appetite then to pride, and then to false ambition. "She took of the fruit"—The tempter triumphed through his appeal to curiosity, to pride, and to the desire to know what was forbidden and for good reasons. And gave also her husband. Notice the steps in the progress of evil—she saw, she took, evil—she did eat, she gave. "And he did eat"—It is seldom one is alone in sin. Hand joins in hand, and one sinner leads another person into sin.

7. "And the eyes of them both were opened"—Satan was right—and wrong. They knew, and shame came to them—the shame which springs from guilt before God. They broke a divine command, and remorse took hold of them. Innocence was gone.

8, 10. "Where art thou"—A question asked, not that God might know, but that the sin of Adam might seem plain to him. It was like the voice of an accusing conscience. "I was afraid"—He had the fear which comes from sin, and makes one tremble as the moment of detection comes.

12. "She gave me of the tree"—How natural to lay the blame of one's doing wrong on some other person. It is said "a bad excuse is better than none," but that is not always so. Honest confession is best.

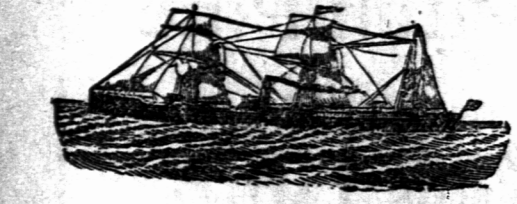
