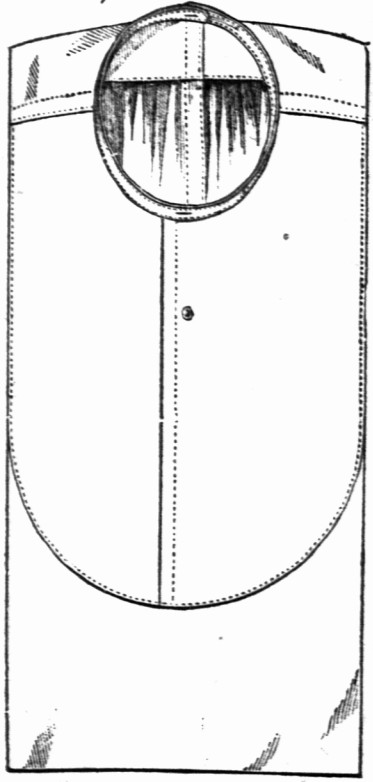

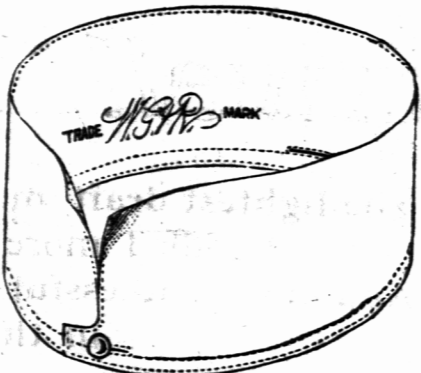

Mrs. Archibald will be here in time for the opening. The only change in this staff will be the appointment of Miss Annie Maxwell as French teacher. While at the University here, Miss Maxwell made a specialty of French and during her vacation she has continued her studies with a view of further perfecting herself for the position to which she has been appointed. -Sackville Post.

The committee for assisting the emigration of the Dukhobortski has made an appeal to friends in Great Britain to defray the extra charges due to the quarantine of the steamer Lake Huron at Quebec. The passengers on that vessel, over 2,200 Dukhobors from the Kars district, remitted to the committee £8,956, to be used in chartering and provisioning a steamer and paying the railway fares from Quebec to Yorkton. The sum was not quite sufficient to cover all these charges, and the committee were further obliged to become responsible to the owners of Lake Huron, in case of quarantine, for a demurrage of £60 a day. A few cases of smallpox developed on the voyage, it is claimed, from some infection taken in Batoum, as there was no indication of such a complaint at the time the vessel sailed. The detention to which this led caused a liability of from £600 to £800. There are also some expenses in closing up in Cyprus. The circular directs that subscriptions be sent to Isaac Sharp 12 Bishopgate whitout, London, C. E. The circular of the committee gives an interesting account of the new settlements in the northwest.

EASTERN NOTES.—Haying is about over, and we will have no harvest for a few days yet. The crop may be called a good one, and other crops are generally promising, though certainly much depends on the weather.—The fishermen are gradually gathering the harvest of the sea and though but few mackerel have been caught since May last, considerable hake have been landed along south side. The quality is superior, and the quantity would be enormous could bait be secured in sufficient quantity. As I write I hear that a large body of dogfish is on the coast, and they will spoil, or wholly stop the fishing while they remain here. These wolves of the sea, the nuisance and pest of our fishermen don't visit our Gulf every season, but sometimes come in immense bodies in pursuit of some other fish, probably squid, and though their taste is not to be commended, or their food envied, while here they cut the lines of the fishermen, and eat the fish of his hooks, so that it is nothing new for a man to visit his trawls with the hopes of a good catch of fish, and find little left, but the heads and backbones, and probably his lines out besides.—But three or four vessels are in the Gulf this summer prosecuting the mackerel fishery, in stead of the hundreds that ploughed these waters before the advent of the destructive purse seine.—The American sea coast towns were represented from Cape Cod to Eastport, while Nova Scotia likewise sent a respectable fleet, and this Island itself, made several determined, though not generally very successful attempts to get up a fleet of its own. Now silence broods over these waters, no schools of mackerel disturb the surface, and no swift and white-winged fleet furrows the water or performs their graceful evolutions round the historic and sometimes fatal East Point reef.—A correspondent recently pressed his claims, or rather the claims of the farmers for an Agricutural College. His arguments were good ones, but it comes to this, where is the money to come from? While we have calls for more school; more money for schools; don't cut down the pay of our teachers; give teachers of the third grade same as first; we want more roads, etc.; want some bridges, but don't tax us; tax the other fellow if you wish. Our revenue, is by no means too plenty, as this and the preceding Government know too well.—As the vacancy in the Queen's County Judgeship has been filled by a very capable man, and one well-deserving to form its party, and one as well deserving of its ennoblement and honors as any other, would it not be well for the people, the source of all power, the source of the greater part of our revenue, to ask themselves if they are not paying dearly for the Administration of Justice.
