UNEMPLOYED NUMBER 936-
Total number of unemployed men
in this city registered with the
city council employment and re-
lief committee was 936, it was
learned yesterday. Of this num-
ber approximately 110 are em-
ployed on projects within the city
or ones over which the city has
control. Sixty-five of the 125 men
at work at the new Airport site
for the past few weeks were
laid off early this week. Work
slowed up because of shortage of
tractors to assist in stumping op-
erations. Only one machine was
available, it was learned, but civic
authorities expressed hope that
two additional tractors would ar-
rive shortly when employment
would be provided for a full crew
again.

hours were chased with flying feet.

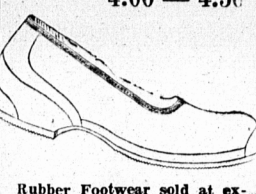
KINSMEN'S CLUB-Guest
