SUICIDE.—The body of John Cahill, aged 58 years, of Kingston, was found in Scott's mill pond at that place Monday. He was unmarried. On Tuesday Coroner McLeod held an inquest on the body. In the evidence it was brought out that the deceased had been melancholy for the last 4 weeks. On Friday the 9th inst., he deceased in company with several others at Barratt's forge. He appeared to be much better. On being asked if he was going home he said "No, not now." He then started off in the direction of Scott's mill pond where he was seen shortly after. One witness saw him standing near the waste gate looking down into the water. On witness' appearance he deceased stepped back some paces. Witness who had come for a pail of water, saw the deceased return to camp when he left. When he got to his house he could not see him. Sunday a search was made for him and the pond was dragged. Not finding any trace of him the pond was dragged a second time Monday this time with success. The following juryman were empanelled for the inquest.—W. H. Barratt (Foreman), John McDougall, Andrew McElroy, Peter Trainor, Chas Willis, Benj Newton, Thomas Yeo. After hearing the evidence the jury came to the following verdict, "That the deceased came to his death on Friday the 9th day of Dec. inst., by drowning being in the opinion of this jury his own act while laboring under temporary insanity."

The following extract from a letter of the Rev. T. W. Cauliffe at Fort Kelly Assiniboia, may prove interesting to those interested in North-west Missions:—"There is a great need of all kinds of clothing for our poor Indian Missions, as we have work going on in several of the reserves. * * * Perhaps some account of my work might interest you. I batch, that in the local term for doing everything oneself, and as I am single, I find the housekeeping part rather troublesome. Then I teach school during the week, and this there is my Sunday work to do and to get ready for all, taken together, is no light work to do single-handed. I had a "lay reader" with me, until recently, but he has gone to work in another part of the diocese; and I miss him very much, as it is such a solitary life to be all alone. "Still it has its bright side; and the boys frequently come to see me and help me. And I am very fond of boys. So it is not so very bad after all. There is one little boy who comes every day, to fetch water, carry wood, wash up, etc. * * * I received a very small pair of shoes for a baby among some things that were sent me; and I gave them to my interpreter's wife, who has a little daughter a few months old—and the wonder and exclamations of surprise were most amusing when they came to show as it was the first time they had seen such a little pair. "We have a neat little log church, which has just been lathed and plastered. * * * We managed to get it done without going into debt; and my people are too poor to give money (in fact they never have it); they banished the lime stones, wood, and built the lime, and gave that as their portion of the work. * * * They are very reverent in church—their conduct would put a good many white congregations to shame.
