LABOR READY FOR ELECTION

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
LONDON, March 4—The British Labor party has cast its lines for a general election in the fall.

National conferences have approved its programme of action. Its appeal is ready. The election may not come. Ministers of the crown have vied in positive declarations that there will be no dissolution this year. Yet Labor is organizing.

And its policy is the creation of a new social order, a British socialist commonwealth and peace.

The great dominating aim is peace — organization of peace through the League of Nations, removal of causes of war. There are to be no secret alliances, treaties or engagements of any kind. A Labor majority would pass a peace act of parliament which would:

(1) Make it impossible for any British government to use force as an instrument of national policy, without violating the law of the land.

(2) Empower the government to apply any economic and financial measure necessary to take its share in collective action.

Duke of Gloucester Visits Panama Canal

COLON, Canal Zone, March 5. (AP)—The Duke of Gloucester, third son of the King, paid a brief visit to the United States today, and then continued on his tour which has taken him virtually around the world.

A first-hand glimpse of what the Panama Canal looks like from the air was given the Duke when he went up for a flight in an United States Navy amphibian plane piloted by Lieut.-Commander R. E. Davidson.

Abandoning the plane for a tug, the Duke then crossed the Canal and boarded H. M. A. S. Australia, which headed immediately for Kingston, Jamaica, where the Duke will ride in the Polo Stakes Wednesday.

In Kingston he will greet for the first time since their wedding the Duke of Kent and his new sister-in-law, the former Princess Marina.

After the Australia arrived today from the Antipodes the Duke paid his respects to President Arias of Panama and Lieut. Col. Julian S. Schley, Governor of the Canal Zone. He was greeted with full military honors.

Famous Up-Side-Down Stomach Is Righted

FALL RIVER, Mass., March 5. (AP)—The "upside down" stomach of Alysce Jane McHenry was set right today in a prolonged operation of peculiar difficulty, an operation carrying an added touch of sympathy drawn from the child's own faith.

Late in the afternoon, attending physicians described her condition as satisfactory.

They said she was sleeping and that her pulse was 120, about normal.

Whispers were repeatedly heard in the operating room, as the chief surgeon, Dr. Philemon E. Truesdale, a native of Rawdon, Que., performed his delicate tasks.

"Bully!" was one spoken fervently. "That's splendid!" was another.

All was heartiest cheers for the chief surgeon as one after another knotty tangle of vital organs untangled under his swiftly moving fingers.

Whether the prayers are to be answered was unknown tonight. The strain was terrific on the child, but she showed surprisingly well. She has apparently a good chance. But it may be several days before there is certainty.

Virtually all Alysce's digestive organs were up in her chest where her left lung should be. The lung, too, was there, collapsed under the pressure of stomach, intestines, large and small, spleen and appendix were in the chest.

It was the appendix that forced a change in plans of the operation after her chest was opened. Dr. Truesdale had expected to let the organs move slowly and gently down from the chest, but they would not budge. They were born in the wrong place. There might not be room enough for them in the abdomen, but if the change could be made slowly the abdomen would adjust.

The appendix, however, was up near her heart instead of down near her right hip bone. To save her life the whole change had to be made in a single operation. Dr. Truesdale had to free adhesions, tissues which fastened the misplaced organs to chest wall, and placed them in their proper place.

As each difficult step was made without a slip, the barely breathed cheers ran through the operating room. The famous upside-down stomach itself was one of the first to get started down. It was tight up under Alysce's left shoulder.

One of the least and most difficult feats was to swing up the appendix in which Dr. Truesdale had made an opening five inches long and three across in order to let the lost digestive organs pass down from the chest cavity.

The operation on superficial appearances accomplished everything desired. The question Alysce's life, however, depends to quite an extent on whether the abdomen that never had these digestive organs can accommodate itself to them now on such short notice. Nothing developed during the operation to indicate there would be such a trouble.

Method For Control Of Measles

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
TORONTO, March 4—Blood serum from adult persons who have had measles is recommended to physicians and public health officers as a means of measles control in a communication today from Dr. J. A. Faulker, Ontario Minister of Health.

Dr. Faulker considered the development of particular importance to Toronto, where, during February a new high measles record was established with 2,746 cases.

Dr. Faulker claimed the serum possessed specific properties for prevention and when administered to exposed persons tended to minimize the illness and prevent its development. One advantage of the plan, he said, was the general possibility of obtaining the blood from one or other of the parents, adding it was not necessary to "type" the blood.
