BRANT MAKING 'COMEBACK' IS BELIEF

Sportsmen will be pleased to learn that the latest game survey conducted by the R. C. M. P. show that brant are present in the Province this spring in greatly increased numbers...

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Secret Documents Disclose King George V's Pre-war Warning To German Kaiser

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, May 5.—Publication tonight of secret documents of the British Foreign Office disclosed that King George V warned Germany two years before the Great War that Great Britain would aid France and Russia against attack.

The manuscripts disclose a letter the late King wrote to Sir Edward Grey, then Foreign Secretary in December 1912.

It informed Sir Edward the King had told Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of the German Kaiser, that "in the event of Germany and Austria going to war with Russia and France" Great Britain "undoubtedly" would aid the attacked nations.

This was among hundreds of documents included in the 10th volume of "British Documents on Origins of the War."

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Old-fashioned Tariff Battle In Parliament

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, May 5.—Speaking as one connected with the farm implement business since his own firm (C. L. York-Sunbury) said the increase put into effect last November was the most unpopular for and the least justifiable.

Mr. Clark resumed his debate on the report of the Committee on Farm Implements when the House resumed after the dinner recess.

In New Brunswick it would take 50 barrels of potatoes this year to produce the same amount of potatoes as last year.

"Evidently the manufacturers got together in regard to costs and arranged the mark-up without regard to conditions or costs," Mr. Clark said.

"The price of the implements is not the same as it was in 1914, and the price of the raw materials is not the same as it was in 1914."

"I answered undoubtedly yes under certain circumstances. He did not ask me what the circumstances were. He said he would tell the Emperor what I told him. Of course Germany must not be allowed to allow either of our friends to be crippled."

"I think it is only right that you should know what the Emperor's brother on this point."

Some time later the King received from Prince Henry a letter in which he asked the Emperor to reduce the tariff of 7 1/2 per cent that is paid by foreign manufacturers on imported machinery.

The debate arose on a motion to adopt a committee report tabled last session after an investigation of the farm implement industry.

The tariff on implements was raised to 25 per cent by the Bennett Government. The Canadian American Treaty, signed Nov. 11, 1935, reduced it to 10 per cent and the budget of 1936 dropped it to 7 1/2 per cent.

Mr. Massey said that if the duty of implements dropped according to the terms of the treaty, the average western farmer on a half-section of land would be \$3.68 a year.

He suggested this saving was out of all proportion to the loss that would be suffered by the implement business but in secondary industries as well.

If the Canadian market could be reserved entirely for Canadian manufacturers, it would result in lower costs to the farmers because of the increase in volume, argued Mr. Senn.

The farm implement industry was monopolistic in nature, countered Mr. Weir. The evidence of the committee showed that the American market was open to all.

Mr. Senn said that if a rough estimate of the cost of the bridge was compared with the amount paid in relief, together with the amount paid for the North River ferry service, the balance would more than pay the interest on the proposed project.

Mr. Douglas said that on a \$20,000 project only about \$10,000 goes to the laboring men. The money expended on the bridge project would practically all go for laborers.

Mr. McIntyre said he was thoroughly in accord with the bridge project. The idea, however, was to get the Provincial Government to contribute the amount of the project.
