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ROUSING CONSERVATIVE RALLY LAST NIGHT

GOERING TO TESTIFY AT FIRE PROBE

Prussian Premier Will Take Stand in Own Defence At Reich Fire Trial.

BERLIN, Nov. 3—(A.P.)—Hermann Wilhelm Goering, Prussian Premier and National Minister without Portfolio will testify tomorrow before the Supreme Court hearing the case of five alleged Communists accused of firing the Reichstag building last February. An announcement today said "The Prussian Premier will testify about the Communist menace at the time of the fire," but it was anticipated that the temperamental Nazi leader will not let slip the chance to hurl defiance at what the court has often referred to as "the monstrous foreign allegations against our leaders."

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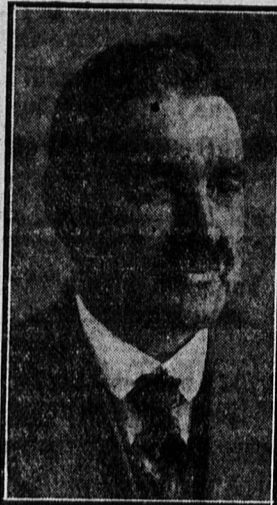
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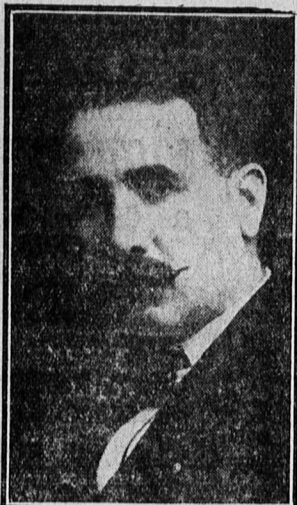

Ontario Government Budgets For Surplus

TORONTO, Nov. 3—Definite announcement the Province of Ontario had not only balanced its budget for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31, but had achieved a surplus on the 12 months' operations of approximately \$150,000 was made tonight by Premier George S. Henry. On Oct. 31, 1932, deficit was \$2,000,000 and a \$2,900,000 deficit for the year just ended was forecast by Hon. E. A. Dunlop, Provincial Treasurer, in his budget presentation to the legislature. Revenue for the year amounted to \$2,450,000 more than was estimated, while the government cut \$660,000 from the estimated expenditure. The increase in revenue, he said, reflected quite markedly "the upturn in business in Ontario that has been evident for some time."

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AMERICAN GIRL SLAIN IN PALESTINE

Body of Joan Winters and Indian Moslem Found Near Mount of Olives.

JERUSALEM, Nov. 3.—(A.P.)—The body of Joan Winters, described as an American professional dancer, and an Indian Moslem were found in an olive grove outside the city wall today. Police said they found no clues which might lead them to the assailants and declared they were at a loss to account for a motive.

The man was identified tentatively as Mohamad Karaman, an Indian civil servant from Madras.

The bodies were found at the foot of the Mount of Olives near the Garden of Gethsemane where Judas betrayed Jesus with a kiss.

Quiet Area

The Garden of Gethsemane, a quiet and secluded spot, is surrounded by a wall that forms an irregular square 70 paces across. It belongs to the Franciscan Fathers who care for it with great devotion and zeal. In it they maintain a modern chapel which attracts thousands of pilgrims every year.

The entrance to the Garden is by a low door, on the side next the Mount of Olives. Just beside the door is a rock marking the place where Peter, James and John once slept. A few feet away a fragment of a column indicates the place where Judas betrayed Jesus with a kiss.

Throughout the region there are many objects recalling biblical times. Eight gnarled olive trees in the garden are said to date from the time of Christ.

The top of the Mount of Olives is just 15 minutes walk away from the garden.

LIBERALS HAVE MAJORITY OVER ALL IN B.C.

Premier-elect T. D. Pattullo And Party Will Control 30 Out of 47 Seats.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3—Indications tonight were the victorious Liberal Party would shortly take over the affairs of British Columbia. While party leaders surveyed the battlefield and counted gains and losses in the most involved election the Province ever experienced, Premier Simon F. Tolmie, whose Unionist administration was practically wiped out at the polls yesterday, intimated he would shortly surrender the reins of office.

Premier-Elect

At Victoria it was learned on good authority T. D. Pattullo, Premier-elect, would probably be sworn into office before the end of the month. No official intimation was given as to when Mr. Tolmie would resign but after the Premier had paid a brief visit at Government House today he said there would be "no undue delay" in relinquishing office.

Mr. Pattullo, whose party was swept into office with a clear majority over all groups said he interpreted the "sum total of the result as a desire for stable government and action."

"There is not much use taking any more just now," he added. "The thing is to start and do something."

Only one seat remained in doubt tonight.

FRENCH GOV'T. GIVEN VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

Premier Albert Sarraut Wins Opening Victory in Chamber of Deputies.

(Associated Press)
PARIS, Nov. 3—The young government of Premier Albert Sarraut won its first victory tonight in the Chamber of Deputies, gaining a vote of confidence in its programme of "sound finances."

The issue leading to a vote of confidence today were virtually the same as those which caused the recent downfall of the Cabinet of Premier Edouard Daladier.

Averse to precipitating another ministerial crisis, fearing the effects on the French franc and the gold supply in the Bank of France, the deputies voted to give the new premier a chance to produce economic restoration.

Twelve Majority

Despite the apparent size of the government majority, the cabinet got only 12 votes over a clear majority in the Chamber, there being more than 200 who abstained from voting. The latter include the Socialists and the group surrounding former Premier Andre Tardieu, who are waiting for specific bills from the government.

Many of the deputies predicted tonight that despite today's vote the government is facing a hard fight.

The premier declared he would stake the life of his ministry on financial proposals which he intends to present fully in a few days.

U.S. Fleet Ordered To Patrol Atlantic

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(A.P.)—The United States fleet will be concentrated in the Atlantic next spring for the first time in almost four years.

President Roosevelt today authorized the first line of defense to start steaming from the Pacific to the East Coast after the winter months. It will return to the Pacific in the fall.

The fleet, comprising the battle and scouting forces—the latter formerly known as the Atlantic fleet—have been stationed in the Pacific since the spring of 1932. A year before they were together off the Panama Canal.

During the past 18 months the Navy has explained that the scouting force was kept in the Pacific for reasons of operating economy. The situation in the Far East was understood, however, to have played a considerable part in the retention of the full fleet in the Pacific.

Japanese officials several times have asserted that the Japanese concentration contributed to tension in American-Japanese relations.

Magnificent Ovation Is Tendered Premier At Party Convention

Federal Members For County Also Enthusiastically Applauded At Largely Attended Meeting At Strand Theatre Last Night. Conservative Achievements In Provincial And Federal Fields Reviewed In Able Addresses. Mr. George D. DeBlois Re-elected President For Ensuing Year.

Wholehearted confidence in the policies and leadership of the federal and provincial Conservative administrations was expressed in speeches and resolutions unanimously endorsed at last night's annual meeting of the Queen's County Conservative Association. The meeting, which filled the spacious Strand Theatre to capacity, was marked by the utmost harmony and enthusiasm. It was presided over by Mr. George D. DeBlois, president of the Association, whose re-election to office is a matter of general satisfaction to all party members.

A magnificent ovation was tendered to Premier the Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan on his first appearance on a political platform since taking office. The occasion elicited one of the most enthusiastic demonstrations witnessed in Charlottetown for many years.

Enthusiastic applause also greeted the other speakers, Messrs. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P., and J. H. Myers, M.P., Hon. G. Shelton Sharp, Minister of Public Works, and Mr. W. A. Stewart, Premier MacMillan's colleague as representative for Charlottetown in the Provincial Legislature, were present on the platform but their addresses were deferred owing to the lateness of the hour.

The achievements of the federal and provincial administrations in a period of unprecedented world depression were reviewed by the chairman and speakers in a manner which roused the audience to frequent and prolonged applause.

In particular, the substantial assistance obtained from Ottawa for employment projects in this Province, and the trade recovery policies initiated by the Bennett Government with other Empire countries, received strong indorsement from the audience.

Loss Deeply Felt

The meeting assembled under the shadow of the loss sustained by the party and province in the death recently of Premier the Hon. James D. Stewart, K.C., to whose leadership and sterling qualities of mind and heart feeling tributes were paid. Other leading party members and supporters who had passed away since the last annual meeting were also referred to in fitting terms.

Resolutions unanimously adopted included expressions of sympathy to the family of the late Premier Stewart, of wholehearted support of Premiers Bennett and MacMillan in the respective fields of federal and provincial activity, and of thanks to the ladies for their support in the last political campaigns.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

On the suggestion of Mr. B. Roy Holman, it was decided to hold the convention annually.

Opening Proceedings

The chairman, in opening the meeting at 8 o'clock, expressed his pleasure at seeing such a very large and representative attendance. He then delivered a comprehensive presidential address, which appears elsewhere in this report, and which was received with general applause and appreciation.

PREMIER MACMILLAN

Premier MacMillan, called upon, had difficulty in speaking for some minutes, so enthusiastic was the applause which greeted his appearance on the flag-draped platform in front of the stage.

"This," he said feelingly, "is the happiest moment of my political career; when I stand tonight facing you, my friends, who have been so loyal to me during all that time; when I appear before you, having assumed the duties and responsibilities of the Premiership. I stand here a most humble person, grateful to you for having conferred upon me the greatest political honour that can be conferred on a resident of Prince Edward Island. (Applause).

"I cannot but say that I regret the circumstances of my appearance to you as a leader, because it brings back to my mind the great loss that we have sustained during the last few weeks, in the death of our late lamented Premier, the Hon. James D. Stewart. Now that he has gone, now that his record is before the people for final judgment, for close analysis and for criticism, there is no one in this audience need have any fear but that it will stand the test of time. No man ever had a more complete sense of his responsibilities and his duties to the public, and in the judgment of his political life and public record no one can point to any single stain upon that banner. (Applause). Knowing him probably better than any one in this hall on account of the close relationship that exists between leader and lieutenant, and on account of the still closer relationship that exists between one man and his physician, I presume to say that I stand in a better position to judge of the character of the late gentleman of whom I speak, and I can truthfully say
