For Sale TORONTO, Jan. 7.—(CP)—Further weakness was registered by the Toronto stock market today. Both mining groups dropped a half-point in the index and the industrials lost .47. The closing tone was soft. Western oils turned up slightly in the final period, mainly on the strength of Calgary and Edmonton. Volume totalled 134,000 shares. Food, liquor and paper stocks retreated and other groups showed little net change. The Hiram Walker issues, weakened 1-4 to 1-2 and losses of 1-4—1-2 were netted by Abitibi pfd, Brazilian, Industrial Alcohol A, Consolidated Bateriales, Dominion Foundries, Fanny Farm, Loblaw A and Consolidated Paper. With a few exceptions, the golds traded in light volume. Kerr-Adison came out in considerable volume and the price weakened 10 cents to \$4. Bralorne lost 25 cents to \$9 and declines of 4 cents came through for Auror, McKenzie, Pickle Crow and Preston. The close was up slightly for Queenston and Wright-Hargreaves. Calgary and Edmonton gained 3 cents, Vermilata 1 3-4 to 9 1-4 and British Dominion weakened 1 to 19.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Stocks sold off rather sharply today as the market awaited President Roosevelt's budget message but after this document was released at midday most issues recovered a part of the losses.

Canadian stocks were firm. McIntyre Mines advanced one point to 32 while Dome Canadian Imperial each gained 1-4. Canadian Imperial Tobacco 5-8, and Ford A and Imperial Oil 1-8 each. Off 1-4 was International Nickel and Lake Shore Mines. Distillers Seagram declined 1-2.

On the day the Associated Press 60-stock average registered a drop of .2 at 38.4. Activity was unimpressive with total transfers at 629,570 shares compared with 801,860 the previous day.

Among stocks closing fractionally lower were U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Montgomery Ward, Boeing, Douglas, American Can, Standard Oil (NJ) and Texas Co. Widely traded were shown by Sears Roebuck, Eastern Airlines, Du Pont and Dow Chemical. American Telephone gave up 1-8 and Coca-Cola fell 2-8 to a new 1941-42 low.

Rail shares came back in the late proceedings and leaders of this department had modest final gains. Pullman Mines, a recently favored specialty, was marked up 2-4 to a new high for the last year.

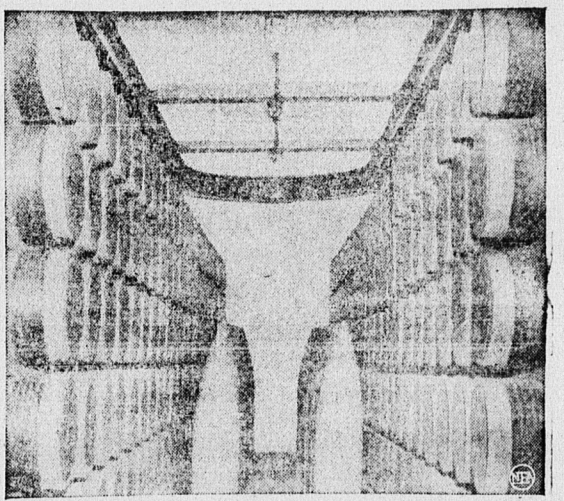

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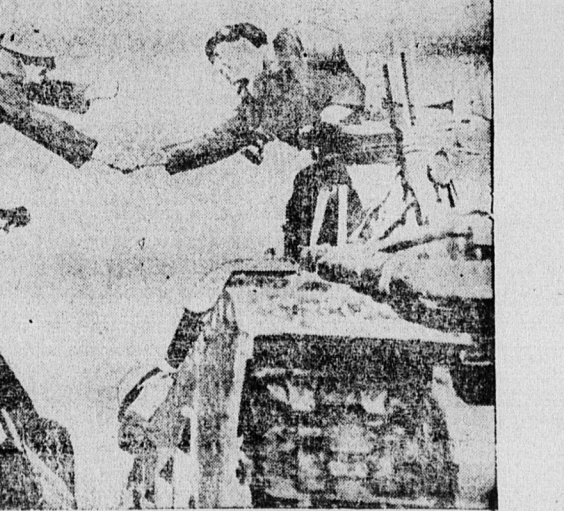
