WEEKLY LETTER FROM J. C. MCKINTOSH & CO.

Nov. 9th 1911 market review.—The favorable trading conditions that have prevailed in the local market for some weeks past have continued. Investors are evidently taking advantage of them to mark up the prices of their own specialties. It is to be noticed that in any general activity throughout the market, some particular stock is taken in hand and put to higher prices, with a view of having it share more fully in the general movement. On this account stocks which a week ago were showing considerable activity, while others which were formerly neglected have been taken up. The general trading conditions are very favorable, unless it be the some of the new traders that are coming into the market may be taking on large blocks that should be gradually resulting in rather precarious. Money is as easy as it is at the present time. Prices may still go higher, a special issue, but quite a number of houses seem disposed to advise clients to take profits. While the local market was not affected by the decline in Wall Street, still the better market in New York has affected the local from a sentimental standpoint, as much as any marked strength in issues like C. P. R. and Soo are quickly reflected in the higher prices of the same securities in the Montreal market.

Among the power issues Shawinigan came in for some attention. It went to a new high level above 119. Montreal Power and other issues had received some attention, and the activity in Shawinigan made it look as though it was now having its turn. The floating supply of Shawinigan is particularly small and any volume of buying orders always results in bringing about marked advances. The Company is now delivering a very large amount of additional power to the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company, and the earnings for the month of November will reflect the additional revenue being obtained.

Mexican Power Bond Issue.—Mexican Light and Power which has shown some activity on buying for London account, was scarcely affected by the announcement that the company would issue 15,000,000 of 5 per cent. Second Mortgage bonds. Usually such an issue would be regarded as an unfavorable development, but in the present instance it is understood that the money being obtained from the sale of the bonds is to pay off all the outstanding liabilities, and that this will pave the way for increased distribution of the common.

Canadian Converters which has been on the quiet side for some weeks, attracted attention by a sudden move from around 36 to 42. There has been very little market for this stock recently, but the improvement is thought to reflect the better condition the companies included in Converters are now in, as a result of finding a better market for their staple lines.

R. O. Dividend.—Richelieu and Ontario has continued to show considerable activity, but the irregularity in the price has indicated that there must be some considerable difference of opinion among the directors, as to just what would be the best course to pursue with regard to the next dividend distribution on December 1st. One of the directors has said that an 8 per cent. dividend could be counted on, but afterwards his particular director denied having made such a statement. If, in reality, a high rate of dividend is coming, Richelieu does not seem to have had the market support that would indicate it.

Considering the big advance that has been experienced in the stock of the Steel Company of Canada, traders have wondered why the stocks of the Dominion Steel Corporation did not share to a larger extent in the general market advances. Lately there has been a disposition to believe that the close relationship that exists between Sir William Van Horne and Fernier Borden will result in the new government lending some assistance to the big corporations at least on this count as the company is able to complete and to have its proposed works in operation.

NEW YORK HIPPODROME.

A splendidly successful season continued at the New York Hippodrome. The big spectacular show "Around the World," gains more favor at every performance. Twice daily performances are the rule at the big playhouse at the great auditorium, the seating capacity of which is 5200. Prouses, filled to overflowing both at the matinee and at night. A real tour of the world is accomplished several times during the three hour performance embracing visits to Ireland, England, Spain, India, Egypt, Turkey, New Zealand, Italy and even Honolulu. The Ballet of Butterflies, the Saksaton in the Desert, the forest fire and the glittering water finale, including the mysterious golden large were added wonders of the great spectacular show. At the Hippodrome of Sunday the Mormon Choir with 300 voices under the directorship of Eva Steubens gave a second concert with an entire change of program.

ONE KILLED TWO INJURED BY BOILER EXPLOSION

BUFFALO, November 11.—One man was killed and two others were seriously injured by the explosion of a boiler yesterday in Elliott Square, one of the largest office buildings in Buffalo. The dead man is Arthur T. Grady, an employee of Howard Bros. boiler works in this city. The men were working on another boiler from which a fire had been torn out a few days ago.

FIRST TOUCH OF WINTER HEAVY IN THE STATES

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Seven men are missing, as a result of a great storm on Lake Michigan. They left Chicago on Saturday morning for a fishing trip in a gasoline launch, and are believed to be lost.

BUFFALO, Nov. 11.—The first blast of winter was ushered in here with a 60 mile gale and a drop of 40 degrees in the temperature. The storm track was marked by shattered plate glass windows, stranded lake freighters, and a demoralized street car service.

There has been a large crop of apples in this Province this year and as fruit growers have had great difficulty in packing and marketing the fruit, this meeting will no doubt be very largely attended. It is to be hoped this meeting will show some way out of the difficulty, and suggestible dealers or the Catechisms in Co., Buffalo, N. Y., and Kingston, fruit growing is invited to be present.

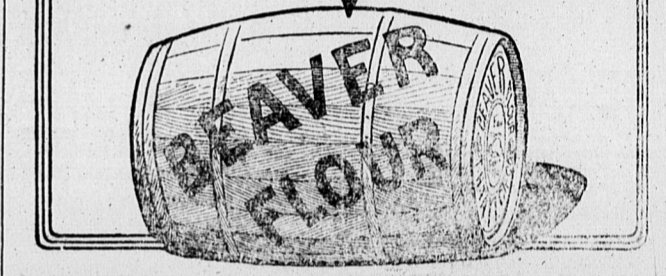
