THURSDAY BRITAIN'S POSITION.

Lord Northcliffe's estimate of the Anglo-German situation is worthy of more than passing notice. He regards the two peoples as generally friendly, says the Toronto News. There is little dislike of England among the inhabitants of Germany, and little hostility toward Germany in England. But that proves nothing. In 1869 the German and French peoples lived amicably side by side. There was no thought of war. But all the time official Germany under the direction of Bismarck was preparing to smite France. The preparations for attack went forward on an enormous scale, for the most part behind a veil of secrecy. France was taken unawares, and we know how soon the Prussian legions occupied Paris.

In the same manner official Berlin is said to be concealing its hand today. That is Lord Northcliffe's belief. "We have the official figures of the German naval program up to 1912, which are serious enough, but we know that these figures are just as inaccurate as were the figures made public by Germany prior to the Franco-Prussian war of 1871. We know that the German press, unlike that of the United States and Great Britain is prohibited from telling the truth about these matters. We know that at The Hague Peace Conference, Germany declined to discuss the limitation of armaments or the use of floating mines at sea." He might have added that Berlin has refused to consider Great Britain's overtures looking to a mutual restriction of armaments.

The second point is that Great Britain requires a strong navy as does no other nation. This because of its maritime position. It draws practically all of its food supplies from across the seas. Other nations need only small navies in comparison. Powerful fleets are essential to the existence of Great Britain and the British Empire, but not to continental land powers. Lord Northcliffe brings the lesson home to the United States by pointing to the fear of a Japanese invasion experienced by the people of the Pacific coast states. That anxiety exists in face of the fact of Japan's immense distance and the further fact that she has no coaling stations on this continent. How would Americans like it if the potential enemy were only eleven hours distant, with a population one third larger than their own, and if that potential enemy were building warships as fast as they were.

A CLEAN ELECTION.

Those who read the evidence given in connection with the election petition presented by L. F. T. against L. E. Prowse M. P., were not surprised that chief Justice Sullivan and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, in delivering judgment yesterday, dismissed the petition with costs, and even the petitioner himself congratulated the respondent on the result. 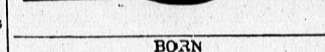
