Warns Suicides Can't Prevent Drowning

PARIS, Aug. 27.—The chief of the river police has issued notification that his force numbers only 25 men for both day and night there fore constant patrolling of the eight miles of river banks at night is impossible. The notification is intended as a warning to avowed suicides that they must expect to get drowned if they throw themselves from bridges into the Seine after dark.

The former prefect of police encountered as one of his first duties to plunge into the Seine to rescue a drowning woman who declared afterwards that she had lost her determination to commit suicide as soon as she touched the water. The latest notice will perhaps warn them to take the plunge in day time unless they are fully persuaded to have done with life.

THIEVES COME BACK LIKE OLIVER TWIST FOR MORE

TORONTO, Aug. 29.—During thieves smashed their way into the home of Louis Gibeber, 333 Lowther avenue, some time during Wednesday night and chopped a large hole through the floor of the drawing room and stole 20 cases of liquor, valued at \$1,800. Six weeks ago, the same house was entered by thieves and 26 cases of high-class whiskey and liquors were stolen valued at \$2,500, making Mr. Gibeber's total loss 46 cases of liquor, valued at \$3,750.
