

# Leafs Too Classy For The Rangers

## Toronto Team Defeat New Yorkers 6-4 Before 16,000 Fans In Madison Square Garden Last Night.

MADISON SQUARE GARDENS, April 4.—The first game of the Stanley Cup series for the world's championship was won by Toronto Maple Leafs from New York Rangers tonight in a free-scoring affair that wound up in a 6-4 count.  
A dazzling attack, with plenty of speed and combination tossed in, sent the Leafs well to the front in the second period and a relentless driving Ranger attack fell short in the third.

### Nineteen Penalties

Nineteen penalties were crowded into the struggle that almost throughout kept a capacity crowd of 16,000 fans in Madison Square Garden in an uproar. Savage checking, terrific bumping, hooking and holding were all on the cards as two top-ranking teams fought it out.

### Heroic Battle

The speed and sharpshooting of the Leafs as they swept to a three goal lead in the second period was scarcely less rivalled for pure thrills and sensational plays as the Rangers fought back in the third. For almost the whole final period the pressure of the New York Rangers was terrific and the Leafs were bottled up. Their checking and the jumping and clearing exhibition of Lorne Chabot in goal turned back the torrid attack.

### Jackson Stars

Harvey Jackson took over the

sharpshooting role for the Leafs, the leading point getter of the league accounting for three goals, all in the second period. Happy Day and Bun Cook scored in the first and the teams moved along evenly until the Leafs' wild rampage cropped out in the second. Jackson opened it on a pass from Day and followed it up on a pass from Red Horner. Completing what seemed to be a rout, Charlie Conacher smashed in a goal, but Cecil Dillon cut down the margin before the period ended.

### Ranger Counter Attack

As unexpected as had come the sudden Leaf onslaught that swept the Rangers off their feet, came the counter attack in the third period. Four and five men attacks swept in to the Leafs. There were scrambles galore and crazily rolling pucks, picked up by swarming Rangers and lifted indiscriminately, kept the Leafs floundering about. Ching Johnson whistled in a goal from inside the blue line. In a desperate struggle in the goal mouth Bun Cook picked up the puck from Boucher and sent in another. From then on until the final few minutes Rangers went on a wild rampage. But the rugged checking of the Leafs as they fought back held off such a drive as even New York fans have seldom seen their Rangers unleash.

Red Horner took the steam out of the attack and settled the issue when he raced in close to take a short pass from Jackson for the final goal.

# The Amateurs To Use The Forward Pass Next Season

## C. A. H. A. Adopts Several New Rules At Annual Meeting — Game Will Be Speeded Up.

MONTREAL, Que., April 5.—(By The Canadian Press) Next season amateur teams throughout Canada will be permitted to pass the puck forward in every area of the ice surface except between the opposing team's blue line and goal line as the result of revolutionary steps in the Canadian Amateur Hockey code being approved by delegates at today's session of the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association here. The delegates gave their approval to a series of recommendations made by the rules committee under the chairmanship of A. E. Gilroy, of Portage La Prairie, Man., Second Vice-President C. A. H. A.

### THE FORWARD PASS

Forward passes across the attacking team's blue line will not be allowed although a player will be permitted to follow a pass across his blue line and pick it up in the centre ice area. It will be necessary for the puck carrier to cross the defending team's blue line first, however, and no forward passing will be allowed in the defending team's defence area. For the assistance of referees the meeting went on record as interpreting this rule to mean that it would not be possible to skate a player outside in the defending defence area. It will be the referee's duty to decide whether the puck carrier, after passing the puck inside the defending blue line, is

interfering with the play. The potential receivers of a pass will be allowed to be body-checked in the defending team's defence area.

### TO ELIMINATE RAGGING

The rules were also amended to allow kicking the puck up to the defending team's blue line and across the attacking team's blue line. A move to eliminate ragging the puck was also incorporated in the code. It was decided that the puck must always be carried forward except if prevented from being done so by the opposing team. A team will be permitted to circle its own net only once before carrying the puck into the centre ice area. The penalty for infraction of this rule will be a face-off ten feet in front of the goal.

A rule was introduced to prevent shooting the puck up the ice but it was not considered by the rules committee. A recommendation to establish a crease in front of the goal inside which shots could not be taken was also thrown out. The committee also threw out a recommendation to reduce the three ten-minute overtime periods now played in case of a tie to twenty minutes of overtime. The meeting agreed that it would be permissible to use what is described as a counter-balance stick—one containing a lead weight in the handle to counter-balance the lightening of the blade.

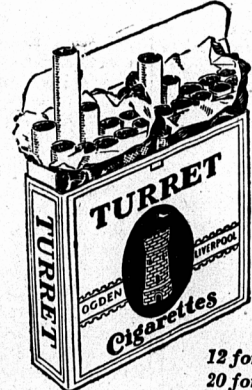

New Contender

New System?

Speeding Up The Game

Judging by the new amended rules to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association's constitution which have just come into being and published elsewhere on this page, it looks as if the amateur game will be speeded up fifty per cent next season. The forward pass in the neutral zone and over the blue line of the attacking team with the kicking of the puck remaining in vogue, is one of the new amendments. The above will eliminate much whistle as offside plays between the blue lines will be a thing of the past.

The Toronto Maple Leaf 6 to 4 win over New York Rangers in the latter's back yard last night stamps the Canadian crew as likely winners of the famous power mug, the Stanley Cup emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship.

# THE FEDERAL GREAT PHAR PARLIAMENT LAP DEAD

NO INFORMATION

OTTAWA, Ont., April 5.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Finance Minister, Edgar N. Rhodes, had no information to give to Robert McKenzie (Lib. Assiniboia) with respect to any proposed national loan, he said in the House of Commons today. The question had not been considered, Mr. Rhodes said. When consideration had been given to it, the House would be acquainted in due course and in the prescribed form.

BANKRUPTCY ACT AMENDED

OTTAWA, Ont., April 5.—Appointment of a "superintendent in bankruptcy" whose duties will parallel in some degree those of the superintendent of insurance is provided for in a bill which received second reading in the House of Commons today. The measure amends the Bankruptcy Act.

Piloting the bill, Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice, declared that many complaints against the operation of the act had been voiced from various quarters. Chiefly those objections were directed against the expenses incurred in winding-up estates, in fees to trustees, lawyers and accountants. If a superintendent were appointed much unnecessary expenditure would be eliminated.

The matter had been considered by a special committee of the Canadian Bar Association, and from this body had emerged a draft bill that had been submitted to the minister. The law officers of the department did not accept all the recommendations of the bill, but a large number of them had been found acceptable.

The minister would go into greater detail on it when the bill reached the committee stage. To deal with it a special committee of the house would be appointed almost immediately.

MENLO PARK, Calif., April 5.—(A.P.)—Phar Lap, prize Australian race horse, which was brought across the Pacific to win the \$50,000 handicap at Agua Caliente recently, died in the racing stables here today of colic and indigestion.

Phar Lap ran under the name of David J. Davis.

Before coming to this country the horse had won \$282,000 on tracks in the Antipodes. To this he added the \$50,000 Agua Caliente purse, the first and only race in which he competed in North America.

It had been learned yesterday that the big racer had undergone a delicate operation on a hoof by Walter Nielsen, Australian veterinarian. Nielsen had come here from Australia with the horse's trainer, Tommy Woodcock.

A special shoe was designed to permit Phar Lap to race at Tanforan, but eight days would have been required to grow the part of the hoof that had been peeled off.

# THE LINDBERGH KIDNAPPING

HOPEWELL, N. J., April 5.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's personal efforts to get back his kidnapped son, which appear to be nearing a climax, were forgotten for hours today while he helped beat out a brush fire that threatened his hill-top home.

Armed with an evergreen branch and an axe, the Colonel joined more than 50 firemen, policemen, neighbors, reporters and photographers in their stubborn fight against the flames, which at one time swirled within 15 feet of the house.

Seen at close range by newspapermen for the first time since the kidnapping on March 1, Lindbergh appeared in excellent health. His cheerfulness as he rested from his labor was interpreted as one more indication he has been making progress in his own recent endeavors to regain his 21-month-old son. Other indications the climax in the five-week old case may be approaching were:

The fact the Colonel's private work on the case has reached a point where he apparently wishes not only to direct the activity of those aiding him, but actually to work out the developments himself.

The two mysterious trips he has made away from his estate within the last three days—last night's trip by plane, apparently to Martha's Vineyard, Mass., near where he also was reported seen in a plane during his absence from here Sunday.

The fact that for two nights a light has been burning in the nursery from which the child was stolen and which has remained in darkness until this week.

The prolonged unexplained absence from his Norfolk (Va.) home of John Hughes Curtis, one of three intermediaries who have held several conferences with Colonel Lindbergh. Meanwhile, there was no report of progress in the police investigation, which has taken one New Jersey State Police official to the British Isles.

Several unusual activities at Martha's Vineyard revived interest in reports that the island is figuring in the negotiations for the return of the kidnapped child.

Five coast guard vessels were seen not many miles off shore. An amphibian plane, similar to the one

which fishermen said they saw Lindbergh piloting Sunday, flew over the island off Nashavena at noon. A dragger, believed to be the Alva, passed Martha's Vineyard at 3 p.m. A civilian was reported to have boarded this craft Sunday, an occurrence which was linked to the visit of the plane.

In London Major Charles H. Schoeffel of the New Jersey State

Police spent more than an hour at Scotland Yard and then left for an unannounced destination.

Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, state police head, in a bulletin from the Lindbergh home, said a report from Scotland Yard "shows there is no criminal record of any kind of the persons investigated."
