JOHN THOMPSON, K. C., WILL ACT BUT ACCEPTS NO FEE

OTTAWA, June 10.—John Thompson, K. C., of Ottawa, has been offered and has accepted the position of government counsel to assist Sir Charles Davidson in the war contracts investigation which opens next week. Mr. Thompson has stipulated, however, that the position is to be an honorary one, that is to say he refuses to accept a fee from the government. Mr. Thompson is a son of the late Sir John Thompson and is a leading member of the bar in eastern Ontario.

Most of the sittings of the commission will be held here in the railway committee room of the house of commons but sittings are also to be held in New Brunswick and in the west.

WILLS ALL TO PATRIOTIC FUND

OTTAWA, June 12.—Probably the most striking example of whole-hearted patriotism shown by a Canadian in the present war is that of the late Nell Campbell, a private of the 10th Battalion from Winnipeg and the Prairie Provinces. He was seriously wounded at Langemarck, the battle in which Col. Boyle, the gallant commander of his regiment was killed. He died of his wounds on May 25th, but before his death he willed all his property to the Canadian Patriotic Fund. Details of his former place of residence and the value of his estate have not yet been received.

THE LUSITANIA DISASTER INQUIRY

LONDON, June 10.—Arthur Fell, Conservative member for Great Yarmouth urged in the House of Commons today that an inquiry into the torpedoing of the Lusitania should serve no purpose and should be abandoned in as much as corner's requests already had been held.

Premier Asquith however, stated emphatically that the investigation should proceed. "That all the facts should be placed on record seems to me to be of the greatest importance," he said. "The fact that some evidence will be taken in camera will not affect the general inquiry."

THREE KILLED AND TEN WOUNDED

PARIS, June 10.—The Havas News Agency has received a despatch from its correspondent at Nish, Serbia, who says that at an early hour this morning three Austrian aeroplanes flew over Kragevatz, where there is an arsenal and aerodrome for shells and ammunition, and threw down three bombs. Three persons were killed and ten were wounded.

Serbian aviators went into the air to meet the Austrian airships as they were returning from the raid at a point near Smederevo. During the ensuing flight one of the Austrian machines, struck by bullets from a Serbian quick-firing gun, fell to the earth in Austrian territory. A thick cloud of smoke could be seen coming from the spot where the machine landed.

O'BRIEN TO RETAIN THE IRISH LORD CHANCELLORSHIP

LONDON, June 10.—The differences between the National party and the Cabinet concerning the appointment of law officers for Ireland have been settled by permitting Ignatius O'Brien to retain the Irish Lord Chancellorship, instead of that office being given to the Right Hon. James H. M. Campbell, and by making John Gordon, Unionist member of Parliament for Londonderry, Attorney General.

Mr. Gordon, although an anti-Home Ruler, is not so pronounced an Ulsterite as Mr. Campbell. The Nationalists agreed to accept him for the sake of the elimination of Mr. Campbell.

At a Nationalist meeting held today, and over which John Redmond, the party's leader, was presiding, resolutions were passed expressing satisfaction that the protests of the party had been successful in preventing the Lord Chancellorship being handed over to a Unionist and especially a Unionist with the record of Mr. Campbell.

The resolutions agree that the party shall abstain in view of the extraordinary dangers of the present crisis, from taking any hostile action against the new Government in connection with the appointment of a Unionist to the Attorney Generalship of Ireland.

SECOND DIVISION NOW SAFE IN FRANCE

OTTAWA, June 12.—Every battalion of the second Canadian division has arrived safely in France. Announcement to this effect was made last night by Major General Hughes, Minister of Militia.

The Division consists of the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Infantry Brigades, respectively, under the command of Brigadier-General Lord Brookes, Col. J. P. Landry and Col. H. D. B. Ketchum; Divisional Ammunition Park, under command of Major Fournette; Machine Gun Battery, under command of Major E. Holland; Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Artillery Brigades and Heavy Artillery Ammunition Column, Divisional Cyclists, Divisional Engineers, under command of Lieut.-Col. Houlston; Army Service Corps and various other units which go to make up a complete division.

No details as to the movement of the troops have been received, nor is information available here as to their whereabouts in France.

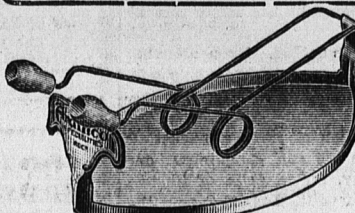

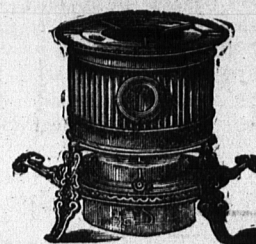

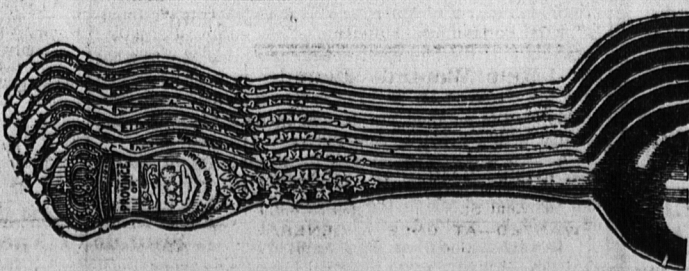
