EASTERN ITEMS.—Aoo her week of comparatively fine weather has enabled the majority of our farmers to complete their summer operations, and as they reckon up the result of their year's hard labor, the proceeds are far from encouraging, in fact the worst known in the Island's history. There have been partial failures of particular crops in other years, but this year a failure in all, and to make it worse for our business men, the harvest of the sea has likewise been a poor one. The eastern people have gone extensively into hog raising this season, and now a number of them find themselves with a horde of hungry, voracious and ungainly pigs on hand; pigs whom the whole crop won't fit for the pork packer.—Lamb buyers are travelling the country at present, buying up the surplus lambs at a fair price. John K. McLean, of Dundas, being the latest, and many of our farmers are coming to the conclusion, that if the time the feed and the attention which are given to the noisy and troublesome hog were given to the gentle sheep, the results would be more satisfactory. Let some of our practical farmers figure out the matter for themselves and I think, they can come to but one conclusion. That the hog has an important part in the domestic economy is true, but that too much attention has been paid him the last year or two, to the neglect of the cow and especially the sheep is equally true. First, as regards labor there is no comparison between that required to prepare the sheep and pigs for market. From the first day of its existence till its last, the hog requires labor, incessant labor, forethought in providing food, and constant attention, and the amount of food ten or twenty hungry hogs can consume is something enormous, food that has been raised by the muscle and hard labor of the farmer and his family, while the gentle sheep requires little or no attention, but will maintain itself and its offspring in situations where no other animal could obtain even a precarious existence. Its presence enriches the soil on which it feeds and detests the noxious weeds in the pasture. The comparison likewise holds true during winter, the quiet sheep needing but little attention, its food is cheap and easily obtained, while the noisy and demonstrative hog has to be fed with roots and grain, which extract the virtue out of the soil and the backbone out of our farmers. And finally when you come to market the products, while the hog market is uncertain, irregular, and the last years generally low, and the unfortunate difference of opinion existing between too many of our pork raisers, and our pork packers, the lamb market has for many years been steady, certain and profitable, and it looks as if the demand in the consuming markets of the world will for years exceed the supply which the sheep-raising countries can produce.
