Legislature In Committee

The Provincial Legislature met at 3:15 p. m. yesterday and the following Government bills were introduced and read a first time:

Act respecting the Provincial Police Force.

An act respecting the controverted election of members of the House of Assembly.

An act respecting companies domiciled or having security registers in the Province of Prince Edward Island.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McGuigan pursuant to a petition from Elmer Younker and others, an act to amend an act to incorporate the Kingston Hall Company was received and read.

On motion of Premier Campbell the House went into committee on the Coroners Act with Mr. Mustard in the chair.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan stressed the need of appointing competent men to the position of coroner and suggested that a medical appointment in smaller places the practitioner was sometimes overburdened and it did not always work out in practice. A discussion arose during the reading of a clause in the bill relating to the power of a coroner to decide whether or not an inquest should be held. Mr. MacMillan thought that the power of the coroner should not be absolute. He suggested that in case of a coroner deciding that an inquest is not necessary a report would be submitted to the Attorney General for a ruling. Premier Campbell said that it was the practice to do so and Sec. 22 covered it.

Dr. MacMillan added that if a coroner refused to perform his duty another one could always be called in.

Referring to Sec. 17 of the coroners' act, Dr. MacMillan stated that a partial autopsy was a dangerous proceeding and in most cases a complete autopsy was necessary. In this connection the words "to such an extent" were struck out by motion of the Premier.

At 4 o'clock the House proceeded to the Executive Council Chamber and presented to His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor, the Draft Address in reply to His Honour's speech.

On members returning to the chamber the Speaker read His Honour's reply thanking the House for their reply to His speech and expressing confidence that they would give due and proper consideration to the different matters that may come before the House.

The House then resumed committee reading on the Coroners Act which was agreed to with minor amendments.

On motion of the Premier the House went into committee on the Sale of Goods act with Mr. Hughes in the chair. It was reported agreed to.

A committee consisting of Hon. Mr. McGuigan and Mr. MacPherson was appointed to confer with the Attorney General to go over the statutes and recommend a more expeditious way to deal with statutes which do not need much revision.

On motion of the Premier the House went into committee on an act respecting prisoners with Mr. MacMillan in the chair and dealing with the hospitalization of prisoners were discussed and progress was reported.

The House adjourned at 6 o'clock to meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

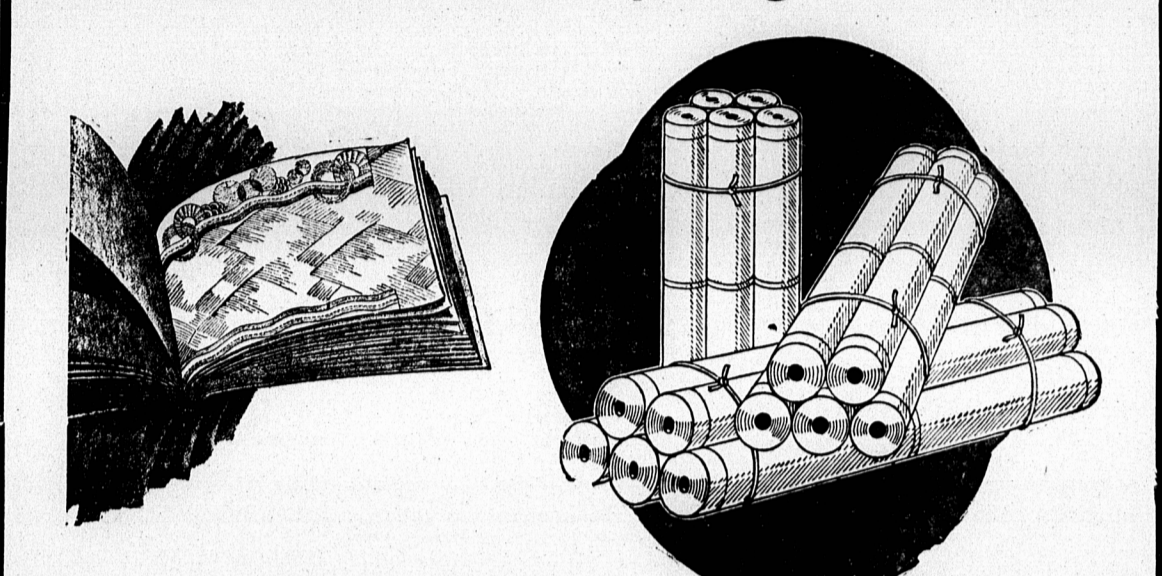
