MR. JAMES MATTIX.

The death occurred on Sabbath evening, Nov. 21st, 1915 at his residence, Springfield, La. S. P. E. I., of Mr. James Mattix at the advanced age of 80 years. Deceased was a man of many good qualities who will be greatly missed by young and old in this community where he faithfully filled the office of Post Master for upwards of 40 years. Mr. Mattix bore his illness with patient resignation to the Divine Will expressing a desire to go to be with his Redeemer. MRS MATILDA YOUNG.

Passed away after a brief illness at her home at Basin Head in the early hours of Sunday morning, Dec. 5th. She was born in the year 1834. Was married at an early age to Mr. Alex. Young. The date and manner of her husband's death she never knew. He had gone to Australia to the gold mines. She heard from him several times, and it was understood that he intended returning home, but was never heard of afterward. It is commonly believed that he actually started, but was shipwrecked on the way, and some further believe that he was lost with many more in a ship which ran on the rocks outside Halifax harbor in 1870. Left to maintain her family by her own exertions, she carried on for a time the sale of fermented liquors at Red Point, but during a revival here in 1875 under the Rev. D. G. MacDonald she was converted and proved the reality of her conversion by pouring away all the remainder of the liquor in her store. Since that time she has been (for forty years) a consistent member of the Baptist Church at Kingsboro. Her son, Washington, was drowned at Basin Head, April 27, 1906, and her son, John Aldis, died at Charlottetown, Mass., about two months ago. This last bereavement she felt very much and it probably brought on the end. She left behind her a clear testimony of her unshaken faith in Jesus Christ. Her mortal remains were laid to rest in the Kingsboro graveyard, the service being conducted by her pastor, Rev. W. E. Piper. She leaves a son, Charles, and a daughter, Mrs. Stillman, with several grandchildren and other relatives to mourn her loss. (Other papers please copy.)

WESTERN TRAIN.—The western train arrived on time last night.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.—The first, second and third degrees of the Knights of Columbus were exemplified on Monday afternoon and evening, the class numbering between forty and fifty. The exemplification took place in the Knights' hall on Queen street, and the new members came from all parts of the province. A large number of members witnessed the conferring of the degrees and the work was exceedingly well done. The first and second degrees were conferred by Grand Knight Lawrence Smith and the third by Past Grand Knight, Dr. W. J. McMillan, each being assisted by a competent staff. Before the exemplification of the third degree a collection was taken up for the Catholic Orphanage and the sum of \$117 was realized. The membership of the Knights of Columbus is now between 300 and 400. The Council now owns one of the finest homes in Canada, to which in the near future it is proposed to add a large wing for degree work, entertainments and other purposes.

ON SOUTHERN ROUTE.—The Plant liner Evangeline is now at the Plant Wharf fitting out for a run to New York, where she will enter the New York-Bermuda service, making two trips a week. The Evangeline has been overhauled and painted, presenting a very fine appearance. This palatial liner has been lying at anchor in the stream since coming off the Boston, Halifax and Charlottetown run last summer.—Halifax Herald.

ISLANDER IS ARCHBISHOP.—Cables received at Ottawa from Rome state that Mgr. Sinnott, Secretary to the Papal Legate at the capital, has been created Archbishop of Winnipeg. This is a new diocese. The diocese of St. Boniface has been divided, and Mgr. Belliveau, of St. Boniface, has been chosen as successor to the late Archbishop Langevin. The new Archbishop of Winnipeg is a Prince Edward Islander, a son of the late John Sinnott, of Morell. He is about forty years of age and a former student of St. Dunstan's College. He is a man of exceptional ability and preacher of great power. His appointment to one of the highest positions in the Church will give great pleasure to many friends of all classes and creeds in his native province.

WILL MOBILIZE NATION'S FINANCES

LONDON, Dec. 13.—After an explanation by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, and a short debate, the House of Commons this evening passed the second reading of the Bill empowering the Government to mobilize American and Canadian securities by purchase and allowing them to be used primarily as collateral for loans, or in case of necessity, to be sold to meet Great Britain's liabilities in the United States. The scheme is entirely a voluntary one and the Government had no intention of swamping the American market with securities, which would be unfair to holders here as they were to be paid for at the market price.

Mr. McKenna explained that the usual trade balance in favour of Great Britain had been exhausted by the huge demands made upon America for goods for England and her Allies and the amounts paid in interest on foreign securities held here, or earned by British shipping, were not sufficient to set this right. Consequently, in order to meet the liabilities in the United States, they were obliged to go outside the ordinary course of trade and had to borrow or sell securities. He estimated that the securities held here were valued anywhere from £300,000,000 to £300,000,000 and expected the hope that this would be sufficient to meet our liabilities and to maintain exchange in the United States for the period of the war. The Bill met with general approval, although David Marshall Mason doubted whether the scheme would affect exchange, while Frederick H. Booth hoped the Government would assist traders who had to meet liabilities in America and "that these transactions will not lead to New York replacing London as the financial centre of the world."

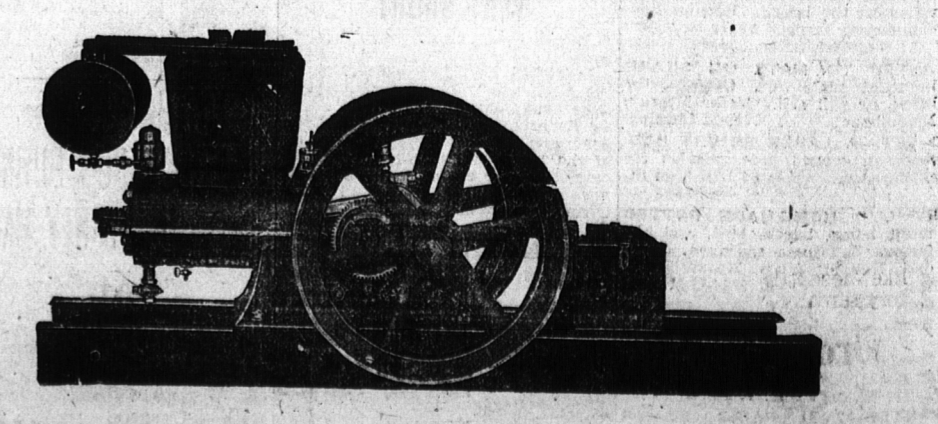
