TORONTO, March 1.—The first tangible evidence that the bowlers who are going to take part in the first annual Bowling Tournament of the Canadian Bowling Association, which starts March 21 in Toronto, are going to shoot for something besides glory, is now evidenced by the arrival of the Cup in its actual size have now been put up in all of the bowling alleys throughout the Dominion.
The Cup is a beautiful silver trophy which stands forty inches high and which has been made especially to signify the championship. This Cup will be a permanent trophy and will be played for each year. It has plates around its base upon which will be engraved the name of the winning team each year.

GUERNSEY BREEDERS HOLD ORGANIZATION MEETING

The first general meeting of the Guernsey Breeders' Association took place yesterday morning in the League of the Cross. There was a good attendance. Mr. W. J. Drake of Brookfield, who presided, briefly addressed the meeting setting forth the objects of the meeting and the need for organization. He pointed out that nothing could be done individually, but great things could be accomplished collectively.
The Secretary Mr. Louis Roper, Royal, having read the minutes of the organization meeting held February 11th, also addressed the meeting. He said it was the first meeting of the Guernsey Breeders of Prince Edward Island. There are good prospects in the future as the Guernsey cow is in great demand by breeders. The Guernsey cow has an enviable record of high production and high percentage of butter fat, a percentage greater than any other breed on the Island.
He then gave a review of the establishment of the breed in this province, the first importers being Mr. E. R. Brown and the late Benjamin Heartz, who got their foundation stock from the Island of Guernsey. Since the establishment of the Disease Free Area, orders have been coming in from the neighbouring provinces, and there is not the stock to supply the demand when we can get big prices.
He contended that it was very difficult to get animals of this breed at any price on the Island. This is the time now for the Guernsey breeders to get busy. He referred to the Guernsey cow owned by the late H. W. Corning of Yarmouth, whose 22 head of cattle realized \$27,000. At the Mixer Farm sale last year 80 head sold for over \$1,300 each. At the National Guernsey Sale of 1926, 69 head sold for \$74,525, or an average of \$1,065. Some individual cows brought \$5,000. He believed that a good Guernsey cow would be just as good on the Island as a pair of black foxes today.
He then urged the importation of good calves or heifers, and the building up of good foundation stock. The United States are importing thousands of Guernseys every year.
The chief objects of organizing the Association would be to teach the principle of better dairying and better live stock breeding, and the development of one or more pure bred calves and heifers. Incidentally, a well bred and well fed cow will have more than an even chance to enter the finals for the Dominion championship.
For instance the runs being made competitors now in the semi-finals in other provinces are not averaging any more than 20 on a yearling basis here who are already eliminated have negotiated more than 22.

Constitution and By-Laws
Be it known that we, the undersigned, desiring to form and organize a Guernsey Breeders' Club for the Province of Prince Edward Island, do hereby associate ourselves together and adopt the following Constitution and By-Laws:
1. This Association shall be known as the Prince Edward Island Guernsey Breeders' Club.
2. The officers of this club shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer and a Board of Directors, not less than six in number, all of whom shall be annually elected or appointed at the regular annual meeting to be held on a date to be determined by the directors from the regular membership of this Association.
3. The government and management of this club shall be vested in the officers and board of directors, each of whom shall be a breeder of Guernsey or Guernsey grade cattle.
4. In the case of death, resignation or removal of any member of the directorate, the Board shall have power to appoint successors for the remainder of the unexpired year.
5. The Secretary-Treasurer shall hold office of both Secretary and Treasurer. As Secretary he shall keep the records of all the proceedings of the Association and meetings of the Board of Directors—in a book kept for that purpose. He shall distribute to each member such literature as is furnished him from time to time. The Secretary has also to act as sales agent for the Association; that is to say, any person or persons having stock for sale may notify the Secretary and he will list the said stock, so that the Department of Agriculture or any person may find out where to locate such stock at short notice.
6. Meeting of the Board of Directors may be held on the call of the President or on the request of three members of the directors at any time whenever matters of special interest to this Association require such meeting and an attendance of five members shall constitute a quorum.
7. All members of this Association shall register with the Secretary-Treasurer and pay an annual

MEETING OF THE SHORTHORN BREEDERS ASSOCIATION

At the meeting of the newly formed Prince Edward Island Shorthorn Breeders' Association held at 11.30 A.M. in Charlottetown with the President, Mr. D. P. MacNutt, in the chair, the members present confirmed business transacted at the inaugural meeting held January 21, when the following officers were elected:
President—D. P. MacNutt, Malpeque.
Vice-Pres. for Prince—Roy Ings, Port Hill.
Vice-Pres. for Queens—W. W. Crosby, Cornwall.
Vice-Pres. for Kings—Clifford McEwen, St. Peters.
Sec'y-Treasurer—W. H. V. Dunbar, Charlottetown.
Board of Directors to include the above officials and in addition the following:
Allan A. Campbell Long River, P. E. I.
John Simpson, Hamilton.
James Irving, Vernon.
J. O. Hyndman, Charlottetown.
Austin Cameron, Cape Traverse.
Seymour Wood, Mt. Herbert.
At this meeting a Committee comprising Messrs. J. O. Hyndman (Chairman), W. H. V. Dunbar, and Mr. Seymour Wood were appointed to prepare a tentative constitution for the association. This committee submitted this constitution which follows:
Article I.—Name
This Association shall be known as the P. E. I. Shorthorn Breeders Association.
Article II.—Object
Section 1. The object of this Association shall be to encourage and extend the influence of Shorthorn breeding and safeguard the interests of its members by creating better trade, opportunities and as far as possible, operate to their general advantage and profit; to promote closer relations among the members and to stimulate greater activities among them.
Article III.—Members
Section 1. Any resident residing in the Province who is identified or interested in the breeding of Shorthorn cattle (grade or pure bred) may become a member of the Club by paying to the Treasurer a fee of \$2.00, said fee to be paid annually thereafter. Any paid-up member is entitled to one vote on all matters that may come before the Club.
Article IV.—Officers
Section 1. The officers of this Club shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, Treasurer and six Directors—all to be elected annually by ballot and to hold office until their successors shall be elected. The President or any one of the Vice-Presidents and any two of the other members of the executive shall constitute a quorum of an executive meeting.
Article V.—Annual Meeting
Section 1. The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held at time and place decided upon by the Executive.
Article VI.—Election of Officers
Section 1. Election of Officers shall take place at the Annual meeting for term of one year or until successors are elected and qualified.
Article VII.—
Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings; in absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside, in his absence a Chairman shall be appointed by the members present.
Section 2. The President, or Vice-President or Secretary-Treasurer, through the Secretary, may call a meeting of the Association at any time he may deem it advisable.

Yanks Stand Pat In Offer to Ruth

NEW YORK, March 1.—The New York Yankees apparently were making no idle gesture to comply with baseball law when they offered Babe Ruth, a renewal of his old \$52,000 a year contract for 1927.
The club intends to stand pat on this proposal, it was learned on good authority today, in spite of the Babe's trans-continental ballyho for a new contract at the record breaking figure of \$100,000.
It has been generally supposed by baseball men that with the rise of players' values, the Yankees would be willing to go as high as \$75,000 to sign their star home run hitter, but as interpreted in reliable sources today, the club is not disposed to make any compromise. Neither Colonel Jacob Ruppert, the owner, nor Ed. Barrow, business manager, would comment on their attitude today, but Col. Ruppert's statement that Ruth's \$100,000 demand was "unreasonable" seemed to support the view that the club is not in a temporizing mood.
