Currency (Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 15—Following the lead of the Paris and London markets where the United States dollar was driven down to a new all-time low, British and gold standard currencies showed a strong display on New York foreign exchange markets today.

The steady fall of the United States dollar was attributed to the threats of currency inflation in Washington together with the growing conviction that the United States eventually will be forced to resort to more drastic action to bring the dollar back to parity.

Pivotal New York Stocks (Canadian Press) Close

The gold value of the United States dollar, as measured against the French franc, declined to 67.50 at the New York opening. This represented a decline of two-thirds of a cent from yesterday's close and of four cents from the 71.50 of the previous day.

The highest level since July 19 when it advanced to 90 1/2. The closing rate today was 67 1/2, a cent net from the closing rate of 68 1/2 on Sept. 15 on United States funds of four per cent.

The pound sterling was at \$1.68 1/2, an extreme gain of 1/4 cent. The close was \$1.67, a fraction above the day's low of \$1.66 1/2. The 5.80 1/2 cent at the close, up 1/4 cent from a cent.

PRODUCE (Canadian Press) MONTRÉAL, Sept. 15—A generally steady market for produce and light trading today. All prices held steady with the exception of butter which firmers fractionally.

Butter market continued at 18 1/2 to 18 3/4 cents a pound for no. 1 grade in cartons or less. Close which was being kept on the British market and a rise in sterling imported encouragement to the trade. Orders are anxious to export as much butter as possible to England during the next few months as an attempt to get rid of the surplus supply in the Dominion. Receipts today totalled 1,610 boxes.

Handling further country boards over the week-end the cheese market held firm. Ontario cheese in cartons or less brought 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 cents a pound with Quebecs half a cent beneath this range. Arrivals were 3,123 boxes.

A fractional firmness was exhibited on the egg market. Graded shipments in cartons or less of Ontario were generally quoted at 22 1/2 to 23 cents a dozen for extras, 17 1/2 to 18 cents for firsts and 14 cents for seconds with whole grades held range down to 21 cents for extras, 17 cents for firsts and 13 1/2 cents for seconds. A total of 1,201 cases was offered for sale.

On the potato market new Quebecs in 50 pound bags remained at 75 to 80 cents.

Kentucky Tots, one of the greatest harness horse meetings in the United States, start next Monday the 18th and continue until the 23rd. The main features for the meeting will be the Kentucky Futurity for three year old trotters and the Transylvania for 2:13 class trotters. In the Transylvania there are more fast record trotters than ever were eligible to the event. Just glance over these. Vansandt 2:01, Calumet Crusader 2:01 1/2, Calumet Bush 2:01, Ankabar 2:01 1/2, Hollywood Roman 2:03, Fair Dreams 2:03, Calumet Anne 2:03 1/2, Nedda Guy (3) 2:03 1/2.

The Kentucky Futurity for three year old trotters should be a bumper with Mary Reynolds (3) 2:03 1/2, Brown Berry, who recently defeated Mary in the Horsemans' Futurity at Syracuse in 2:03 1/2, Taffy Volo (3) 2:04 1/2, Hollywood Portia (3) 2:06, King Ben (3) 2:04 1/2 and five or six others.

Walnut Hall Farm, Lexington, Ky., extends to its friends and patrons an invitation to visit the Farm on Sunday, September 17th, the day preceding the trot at Kentucky. The entire Farm will be open to visitors and there will be a special showing of yearlings, foals of 1932, stallions, brood mares and weanlings. Lunch will be served at noon. That sounds good. Wouldn't you like to be down in old Kentucky tomorrow, under the beautiful shade trees on that grand old Farm at Walnut Hall?

What do you think of this for a price on the Mutuels? At the Ohio State Fair when Billy Dale 2:07 1/2 landed the opening heat of the 2:15 pace he rewarded his backers with \$96.00 for a two dollar bill, and Abe Braden 2:06 1/2, capturing the third returned \$94.00 for the same amount. The same day Scott Wilson paid \$66.40 for two dollars.

The mare Red Chatham by The Earl of Chatham, has produced four pacers with an average record of 2:02 1/4. They are as follows: Louis Direct 1:58 1/2, Myrtle McKlyo 2:00 1/4, Enoch Guy 2:01 1/2 and Big Black Boy who paced to a record of 2:08 1/2 last week over a half mile track.

The Goshen, Indiana, track record (half mile track) for three year old pacers was recently lowered by Little Nell to 2:07 1/2. Two years ago her full brother Little Bob set the record of 2:10.

A new record for two year old trotters in the Mohawk Circuit was made by Princess at Sturbridge, Mass., two weeks ago when she won the second heat of her race in 2:12 1/2. She is a daughter of Guy Axworthy 2:08 1/2 and Aileen Arion 2:11 1/2 by Arion Guy by Guy Axworthy, therefore an inbred Axworthy and was purchased for less than \$100 at the Old Glory Auction last November.

Sturdy 2:04 1/2, two year old trotter that Harry Brusie is racing, had to his credit a short time ago eight races without a defeat. He is a full brother of Baronet, raced by Johnny Conroy here in the 2:25 pace.

One of the most successful owners of horses racing over half mile tracks in the New England States is the wrestling promoter, Paul Bowser of Fair Oaks Farm, Lexington, Mass. Bowser is a big man and was a great grappler himself in his day. He maintains race horses as a diversion and his stable has won fifteen races this season.

One of the best of the string is Bud Azoff 2:07 1/2, a 2:14 class pace eligible, while he has a high class performer in Hollywood Boris 2:07, eligible to the 2:15 trot. In addition to the fifteen firsts his stable has also scored fourteen seconds.

Two of the best miles paced over a half mile track in the east this year were those of the Canadian gelding, Guy the Tramp, by Jerry Harvester, when driven by his owner Will Crummer at Essex Junction. He stepped the third and winning heat in 2:04. The pacer Chief Abbedale, a four year old on

the same day and track also stepped a mile in the same time. Hanover Farm colts and fillies have been selling for ridiculously small prices in recent years at the Old Glory sale. This was particularly true of those sold in 1931.

Isabell Hanover, 1, 1, 2, four years old 2:07 1/2, 2:05 1/2, 2:05 1/2, Laurel Hanover, two year old pacer, 1, 1, 2:08, 2:08. Daniel Hanover, three year old pacer, 1, 1, 2:03, 2:04 1/2. Hanover Express, 2, 1, 1, 2:10, 2:11 1/2, 2:11 1/2. The first heat was won by Master Hanover.

The departure of the King and Queen from Leeds was delayed for an hour, as the Queen by this time was suffering some discomfort owing to the dust that had entered her eye. Lord Moyrhan, who was among the Lord Mayor's guests, examined the eye and removed the obstruction, and the matron and two nurses came across from the Leeds Royal Infirmary near by to help to ease the irritation. It had caused.

Lord Harewood, as Lord Lieutenant of the West Riding, has received a letter from the King at Balmoral in which His Majesty says: "On my arrival here I write to assure you again how much the Queen and I appreciate the loyal and enthusiastic reception accorded to us by the people of Leeds."

"We shall always remember the truly Yorkshire welcome given to us by the large crowds who lined the streets, as well as by those who were present in the Victoria Hall. "The Queen and I have carried away the happiest memories of a most enjoyable stay in the West Riding, and to one and all we send our heartfelt thanks."
