—J. L. McCULLOUGH.—The passing of Mr. J. L. McCullough from the life of Summerside leaves a blank that it will be hard indeed to fill. Coming to Summerside from St. John, N. B., about thirty years ago he by his genial manner and great interest in all things for the welfare of Summerside has become, as it were, a part of the place. For about twenty-five years he had conducted a ladies and gentlemen tailoring establishment and his sartorial prowess is known over all the interest in all things beyond our shores. "Joe" as he was fondly known, was particularly prominent in the sporting life of the town and the success of many of the famous aggregations which have brought fame to Summerside could be attributed to his interest and energy. He was the "father" of baseball in Summerside and the official umpire of the Baseball League, his decisions even in the heat of contest being accepted without question. Mr. McCullough will be greatly missed in the C. M. B. A. St. Vincent de Paul's Society and St. Paul's Club, he being closely identified with these societies and, as was characteristic of him in all things, an ardent worker in each. He was also a member of the School Board. His fifty-seven years of life were given to a devotion to his wife and family and for the advancement of Summerside. After attaining the age of womanhood his two eldest daughters, Helma and Mr. Thomas passed away a few years ago and Mr. McCullough never really recovered from such a great loss. He became seriously ill a little over two months ago and despite all that medical skill and tender nursing could do he passed to his eternal reward at 4:49 o'clock Wednesday morning. He leaves to mourn a grief-stricken wife and three daughters: Miss Faustina of the Provincial Bank staff, Summerside and Nora and Mary at home. A brother, Mr. Thomas McCullough, St. John, N. B., and a sister Mrs. Walter Restein, Beachmont, Mass., also survive. His funeral takes place on Friday at 9 o'clock from his late residence, Spring Street to St. Paul's Catholic Church. Interment will be made in St. Paul's cemetery.

—CLOTHING AND FOODSTUFF EXEMPTED FROM INCREASE
PARIS, Nov. 28.—Minister of Commerce Raynaldy has introduced his bill in the Chamber of Deputies revising the customs tariff. It deals with more than 350 articles or more than half the whole tariff schedule, comprising 654 articles. The increases do not affect food or clothing. The protective incidence of the new dues is only 5.71 per cent.
—SCRAPING THE TRUNKS OF TREES
 The trunks and large limbs of old apple trees often are covered with a mass of dead bark in the process of peeling off. It forms hard and gritty incrustations, which are breeding places for insects, is unsightly and serves no useful purpose unless perhaps very slight protection against drying winds and the cold of winter. These bark fragments may well be cleared off by scraping lightly with a hoe or other more convenient implement, but it should not be done in fall or winter, as often practised. This is an operation for early spring rather than for the cold winter months because of the possible protection afforded by the bark.
