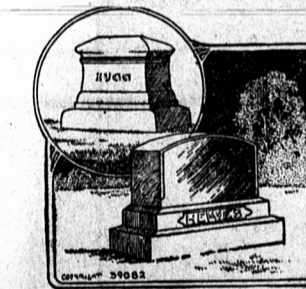

A REAL BIG INDUSTRY FOR CHARLOTTETOWN

(Continued from page two) Market? Why, my dear Sir, our Company is not likely to ever catch up with the orders that will be received. Situated as we are here we have all the market that we will be able to attend to for many years, and I have no doubt whatever that inside of five years the capacity of the mill will have to be doubled.

"The cost of production will, of course, be a determining factor," said the Guardian.

"Beyond a doubt. And I am glad you mentioned it, because it gives me the opportunity to convince you that we can produce rolled oats cheaper here than in any other part of Canada, for the following reasons:—

(1) The valuable concessions which the Company will enjoy will give it a very advantageous position in the manufacturing world.

(2) Labor is cheaper here than in any other part of the Dominion.

(3) The oats are right at our door, and do not have to be brought long distances by rail. As our elevator will be at tide-water we can bring in half a million bushels of oats by boat every fall from the outlying ports of the Island, at a lower cost for carriage than they can be put down at any other mill in Canada, having none.

(4) Shipping facilities are good. There are some people who knock everything that comes along on general principles. These people drag out the transportation problem as a great big bogey. Let me tell you there is nothing in it. Shipping freight is not like shipping mails, nor like passenger traffic. If Northumberland Strait should be blocked by ice a few days now and then in the dead of winter it will not be a very terrible matter to our Company.

(5) We will have economical expert management. Our mill superintendent, J. G. Brew, is a well known miller, whose strong points are economy and efficiency. Under his management the Company's manufacturing business will be run at the lowest possible cost, compatible with the higher efficiency.

"Some people say that the moisture in Island oats will be a drawback," said the Guardian.

"Experience proves that there is nothing in this theory. Island oats have been rolled in times past by Gunn & Co., Halifax, who never had any difficulty on this score. On the contrary, they got more for Island rolled oats than for Western Canadian rolled oats, which they handled at the same time."

"Will you specialize altogether in rolled oats?"

"Not entirely. Flax-seed meal will be produced, if the Island farmers will but give us the flax-seed. There is a large demand for this stuff in Great Britain for stock feeding. Mr. Brew manufactures it very largely for Jas. Clow & Co., Fortadown, Ireland, where he is the mill superintendent. And if the grain is raised by Island farmers every bushel they produce will be bought by the new Company.

"You will thus be developing entirely new lines of business in this province?"

"Exactly. Nobody's ox will be gored. Vested interests are not likely to be disturbed, as we are not aware of any competitors in this Province in these lines."

"Do you think your allotment of \$150,000 of stock for this Province can be sold?"

"I would not care to insult the intelligence of the Island people by assuming for a single moment that they will not do their best to get this industry started. Here is the most substantial of all industries—the manufacture of a staple food product—which can be established in this city under a combination of favorable conditions that has never been equalled in the milling trade. No, Sir, I do not think you need have any apprehensions on this score. Dozens of fox companies have been capitalized here this year, with an aggregate capital of millions of dollars. At all the money and all the good sense of the people of this Province are not concentrated on the fox business, to the exclusion of everything else. I am not saying anything against the fox industry. Long may it continue to prosper in my fervent prayer. But at the same time there are other things in the world besides foxes, and I do not believe that any proposition could be submitted to the people of the Island that contains so many elements that make for success, as the one we are now discussing. I do not claim, mark you this, that prodigious profits will be made by the P. E. Island Cereal Company, not, at least, at first. I do believe, however, for reasons already given, that the Company will not have any difficulty whatever in meeting its dividend obligations so far as the preferred stock is concerned, and I have the authority of Mr. Brew behind me when I say that there is a strong probability of the common stock paying a dividend within three or four years. Other rolled oats companies not as favorably situated are paying large dividends. For the benefit of prospective investors in this enterprise I may say that a bonus of 50 per cent. of common stock is given with the preferred, or one share of common with two of preferred. Before very long the common shares may be worth at much as, and perhaps more than, the preferred stock, so that those who get in now will stand to get an excellent return on their money."

"When will your mill be in operation?"

"Next fall if all goes well. Building will begin as early in the spring as possible. The mill will be finished in time to handle next season's crop, although it is possible that the completion of the elevator may be deferred until the end of the year. However, Mr. Brew will be here to superintend construction as soon as the work is started, which is a guarantee that things will not only be pushed with all possible expedition, but also that the mill and plant will be safeguarded in every possible way."
