

Bruins Break Slump With 4-2 Win Over Leafs; Habs Move Into 2nd Place

BOSTON, Nov. 13 — (AP) — The cellar-dwelling Boston Bruins scored a 4-2 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs here tonight before 10,886 Garden fans to gain their first National Hockey League triumph in nine starts.

The victory was costly for Bruins as centre Eddie Sandford severed a tendon in his ankle during the opening period.

The 21-year-old Sandford collided with Bill Barliko in the centre zone and he apparently fell out that Toronto defenceman's skates. He will be sidelined for at least six weeks and Byrd Bettis, 19, year-old winger, has been called up from the Hershey American Hockey League farm team as a replacement.

Bruins, who had only a tie out of their previous eight starts, spotted Maple Leafs two goals during the first four minutes.

Montreal Alouettes Win Big Four Football Title

OTTAWA, Nov. 13 — (CP) — For the first time since 1931, Montreal has the Big Four football championship in its pocket.

Finish to the Interprovincial Rugby Football Union season came Saturday when Montreal Alouettes came through with a powerful last quarter spurge to defeat Ottawa Rough Riders 14-13 and take the round in the home-and-home, total point series, 36-20.

It qualified Montreal to meet Hamilton Tigers in the Eastern Canadian championships. The winner will play the western champions, Calgary Stampeders, Nov. 26.

Entering the game with a 15-point margin earned in a 22-7 victory over Rough Riders in Montreal last Wednesday, the Alouettes had trouble before the final quarter.

Reversing the close-playing tactics in the face of an almost-fanatical Ottawa bid for a winning major, Frank Pilchcock started throwing passes. One went to Bob Cunningham at mid-field and the speedy back raced 15 yards for the put-away touchdown.

Montreal maintained the pressure. Before the game ended, Al moved in close enough for Ches McCance to add two placements, and on the second last play of the game, Fred Kijek broke the tie with a single.

Despite the late Alouette rally and the 14-13 score, Riders held the statistical edge.

They moved the sticks 24 times, 15 along the ground and at one time marched 88 yards for eight first downs in succession.

O'Brien Second At Inglewood With Brewer's Gallon

INGLEWOOD, Calif., Nov. 13 — (AP) — Jerry the First clipped a full second off the track record Saturday in outstepping 13 others to win the \$50,000-added Golden West Pace at Hollywood Park.

With his co-owner, Eddie Cobb, in the sulky, the five-year-old chestnut stallion got up in the final strides and outlasted the hard-charging Brother Harmony who finished second ahead of Grattan McKlyo.

Jerry the First paced the 1 1/4 miles in 2:31 and collected \$25,000 for his owners. He returned \$8,200, \$4,000 and \$3,400 in the mutuels.

Earlier, Egan Hanover set a new world record for 1 1/8 miles in winning the preview for next week's \$50,000 Golden West Trot. Driven by Ralph Baldwin, the Lloydminster, Sask., reinsman, the Saunders Mills trotter stepped the distance in 2:15 4-5. The old mark of 2:16 2-5 was set here two years ago.

It is with regret that this column notes here the sad news of the death of a well known and respected former horseman of this City, Mr. Harry "Nunc" Walsh, who passed away suddenly at Louisville, Kentucky, last Friday, news which will be received with much sorrow by his relatives and friends here.

Starting his career here as a trainer of harness racing horses for such well known owners as Johnny Conroy, Dr. R. F. Seaman, Wellington MacNeill and Commander George Buntain, "Nunc" was popular among the many trainers, drivers, owners and horse-lovers throughout the Province, and left here some 12 years ago to carry out his work for various United States racing stables.

Continuing his career here, Harry attained much success in the training of running horses and was caring for horses at Louisville, as trainer of the T. D. Buhl stables of Detroit, Michigan, at the time of his death.

This column joins with his many friends in extending sincere sympathy to his brother and only surviving relative, Mr. John A. Walsh of this City.

"Jinks" who is looking in tip-top shape and says that he is in better fighting trim than he has been for the past year, has been doing a bit of boxing on the side from his studies in and around Kentville, and is scheduled to make a couple of appearances there this week. It was only a week ago Saturday that he went six rounds in a no-decision contest with Joe Pyle, present Maritime welterweight champ from New Waterford, and from all reports made a good showing against the classy writer champion of the meet. Jinks admits that he held a good 15 pounds weight advantage over his adversary.

Jenkins will meet Pyle again this Wednesday in an eight round decision scrap at Kentville, and says he is looking forward to the meet. He will also stack up against Baudy Clump of Kentville, a young up and coming Mainland heavyweight this Saturday night as the main feature of a boxing card there.

George MacMillan, our other visitor, is home on a three-week furlough from the air station at Trenton, George, as you will remember, was one of our official referees here during last winter, and officiated in many of the City and Central League clashes during the season. He was one of the many local boys who attended the Coaches and Referees school here last winter conducted by "King" Clancy of the N.H.L. and Pete Kelly, under the sponsorship of the Department of Physical Fitness, and was among the six boys who were selected by Clancy to officiate with him during a special game at the conclusion of the school.

George tells us that he has been offered the opportunity to act as one of the official referees this winter in the Air Force and services league in and around the Trenton area, and is looking forward to the job and feels that the many of the pointers picked up at the school last year and his practical experience here as well, will stand him in good stead this winter.
