IMPERIAL MANIFESTO

LONDON, Nov. 3.—(S. a. m.)—An Imperial manifesto on the outbreak of the war with Turkey has been issued in Petrograd, according to the correspondent of Reuter in the Russian capital. It reads as follows: "In the struggle against Russia, Germany and Austria have incited Turkey into taking arms against this Empire. Immediately after the treacherous attack of the Turkish fleet, the Russian ambassador received orders to leave Turkey."

"Russia will receive this fresh aggression on the part of the ancient persecutor of the Christian religion, and the Slav peoples with tranquility and confidence in God. The valiant armies of Russia will triumph once again—not for the first time over the Turkish hordes. Once again we will know how to punish the insolent foe of our fatherland."

"Our confidence is unshaken that the ill advised intervention of Turkey will only hasten the fatal issue to the empire and will open the way for the Russian settlement of problems on the Black Sea coast which have been handed down by our ancestors."

REV. BRUCE TAYLOR UPHOLDS HUMOUR OF THE SCOT.

MONTREAL, Nov. 2.—To the sound of the piped, the president and officers of the Caledonian Society were led into the auditorium of the St. Andrew's Home, Aqueduct Street, on Friday night. The Rev. R. WATER CAUSES MUCH INCONVENIENCE

(Special to The Guardian) AMSTERDAM, Nov. 3.—The following official despatch, issued in Berlin, has been received here: A telegram from general headquarters dated November 3, noon, states inundations south of Neuport prevent all operations in this part of the country. The water in places is as high as a full-grown man. Our troops evacuated the inundated districts without loss of men, horses or guns. Our attacks on Ypres are progressing. More than 2,300 men, mostly English, have been captured; also several machine guns.

BRITISH TORPEDO BOAT ENGAGES GERMAN SUBMARINE NEAR THE GOODVINS. LONDON, Nov. 3.—Heavy firing was heard off the Foreland at Dover this afternoon. Twelve live shells were fired in rapid succession. The concussion rattled windows at Deal. A British torpedo boat destroyer could be seen outside Goodwin Sands, and it was surmised that the British ship had attacked a German submarine which was known to be in the Channel.

FINE SPIRIT OF PRIDE SHOWN BY CANADIANS AT SALISBURY.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The spirit of pride entertained by the majority of the Canadians now encamped at Salisbury Plain is made evident by several letters of protest from members of the contingent regarding the letter from one of their number, published in the Daily Express, asking for a gramophone and records. "We have come to fight for the Mother Country, not to beg," writes one of the Canadian Seaforth Highlanders, while a joint letter from the boys of the Nineteenth Winnipeg Rifles expresses the opinion that the request was an insult to the other Canadians. The Express says that its readers will doubtless appreciate the fine spirit which these letters breathe. This idea of charity is being frowned upon wherever it crops up. The Canadian War Contingent Association has provided pianos and newspapers in the Y.M.C.A. tents at Salisbury, as well as other articles which are not readily accessible to the men.
