FOR THE ARMENIANS.—Rev. John Emanuel of the Assyrian Church of Armenia is at present in Charlottetown in the course of a tour through Canada in the interests of his fellow countrymen. Mr. Emanuel's credentials are vouched for by the Imperial Russian Consul General in Montreal, and he also bears a letter from His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of this province who has examined his credentials and is satisfied with their authenticity. Mr. Emanuel, who knew nothing of English until he arrived in Canada about eleven months ago, speaks the language quite intelligibly and tells a most interesting story of the sufferings he had seen before leaving his country and of which he had borne his share. He is asking for financial aid for these sufferers and has already sent home about \$2,500 for the benefit of the Assyrian refugees who have fled from Armenia and about 35,000 of whom are now in Russia. He is grateful for the assistance he has already secured and will thankfully receive any contributions that the charitable people of this province may give him for this most worthy cause.

THE ALLIES ARE NOW THREATENING MAIN LINE.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Daily Chronicle dealing with the capture of Monastir, says:—"The situation today is one of open warfare, with the remnants of General Bayadloff's Germano-Bulgarian army in headlong retreat across the Monastir plain and in a position of great danger. "No doubt a splendid opportunity is now offered to the Allied cavalry of which recent mention was made in this region, for harrying the retreating enemy. The plain of Monastir is suitable for cavalry work, more especially as the Bulgars will not find it easy to debouch from the difficult high ground of the Cernabend. Considerable hools of prisoners and material are, therefore, not unlikely. "The Bulgarian line of retreat is along the high road across the plain from Monastir to Prilep. Their base is at foot of the range flanking the Vardar. This road does not run back at right angles from the fighting front, but northeastwards. Consequently the Allies who are already on high ground east of Monastir, are threatening the main Bulgarian line of retreat."

SERBIANS CAPTURE ANOTHER VILLAGE

Taking a Large Number of Prisoners and Inflicting Serious Losses on the Enemy.

(Special to the Guardian) SALONIKI, Nov. 23.—An official communication from Serbian headquarters issued today says: Our troops yesterday successfully followed up their attacks on the whole front. The village of Budimicetas and surrounding heights are in our possession. German bombers recently arrived on our front and counter attacked north of Suedobitbut but were immediately repulsed. Besides inflicting heavy losses on the enemy we captured five German officers and one hundred and eighty-one men and three hundred Bulgarians, including the Colonel commanding the Ninetieth Regiment. Serbian and Allied troops have occupied Paraboro and Dobro-nir northeast of Monastir.

LORD DERBY ON PEACE PROPOSALS

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 23.—"Any peace proposals from Germany will receive the consideration they deserve," said Earl Derby Under Secretary for War, to the Associated Press, in reply to a question as to the attitude of the Allies on peace proposals. "The Allies," Lord Derby continued, "cannot entertain any thought of peace which does not give them what they are fighting for. The Allies have not modified their position in this respect." When asked his opinion as to the duration of the war, Lord Derby said: "I believe any one who understands the temper of the British people will agree with me that they have shown no signs of weakening, but on the contrary, are growing more determined to continue the war to satisfactory conclusion. On the whole the Germans appear equally determined."

SIR THOMAS WHITE POPULAR IN ENGLAND

LONDON, November 4.—(Cor.)—Sir Thomas White, the Finance Minister, who arrived this week in London, is one of the most popular Canadians who visit London from time to time. Everyone who meets him comes away impressed first of all with the sense that he has been talking to a man of great ability and secondly with the Minister's courtesy and charm of manner. When I met Sir Thomas he told me that he was here with the object of discussing with the Chancellor of the Exchequer financial matters of Canadian and Imperial interests. He expects to be here for two or three weeks and during his stay he intends to visit Canadian hospitals and camps. He also hopes to go to the front. He is full up with engagements and does not know how he can keep them all. Sir Thomas said that with regard to business and financial conditions in Canada they were on a particularly sound basis. For the past six months the total trade of Canada had exceeded \$1,000,000,000, an aggregate of the total trade for the year preceding the war. This was due to two causes, increased production and higher prices. The anti-bellum adverse balance of trade had not only been redressed, but it was expected that this year there would be a favorable balance of between \$400,000,000 and \$500,000,000. The essential soundness of Canadian finances was shown by the signal success of the recent war loan. The loan was for \$100,000,000, and subscriptions came in amounting to over \$200,000,000. As the Minister had aimed at funding his indebtedness and avoiding short date obligations, the financial position of the government was exceptionally strong. The Minister of Finance was very hopeful that the greater part of Canada's debt due to the war, would be held in Canada, before leaving Canada he had initiated a thrift campaign or rather a campaign by national saving under a plan whereby those of slender means and small incomes, and the wage earner might accumulate savings and invest them in war saving certificates. He was confident that Canada would be able to provide the Dominion's war expenditure in the Dominion itself, and further arrange for substantial credit to the Imperial government for the purpose of meeting its commitments in Canada for munitions and supplies.

TWO MEATLESS DAYS A WEEK IN FRANCE.

PARIS, November 22.—Two meatless days a week were decided upon by the Cabinet today at a meeting at which the food supply question was exhaustively discussed. After consultation with traders interested in the matter, it was agreed that the two days should be Thursday and Friday, and decree to that effect will shortly be issued. It was also decided to prohibit altogether the making of fresh pastry, cakes and rolls and fancy bread. The smallest loaf will be that of two pounds weight. Crackers and kindred edibles of a dry character will be the only form of cakes permitted.
