Dr. Myers gave a number of valuable suggestions as to how the women as an organised society could be a very strong power in helping to broaden and better the lives of the children. He told of the work carried on in some of the best cities by these associations of women. Among the subjects discussed were: medical inspection in schools, supervised playgrounds, cook-



ing and sewing for public school girls, school gardens, attractive appearance of school rooms, a closer sympathy in work between teacher and parent, etc. The ladies present were deeply interested and realised the possibilities of a society organised with aims as outlined by Dr. Myers. As this meeting had been rather informally and hurriedly called, it was decided to have a more representative meeting in October, of which notice will be given later, at which all women interested in such a movement should be asked to attend and there complete an organisation with aims as above outlined.
