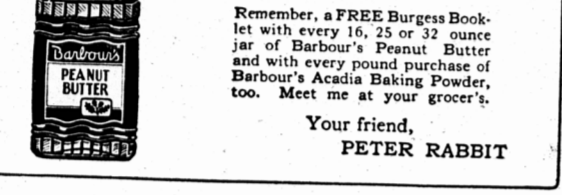

THE HOUSEWIFE AND HER ACTIVITIES



IT TAKES SO LITTLE
It takes so little to make us sad, just a slighting word or a doubting sneer.

And our footsteps lag, though the goal seemed near,
And we lose the courage and hope we had—

It takes so little to make us glad,
Just the chattering clasp of a friendly hand.

And we finish the task we long had planned,
And we lose the doubt and the fear we had—
So little it takes to make us glad.

CLEAN COILS
Brush off the copper coils of the gas heater once a week. It requires more gas to heat the water and takes a longer time when the burners are clogged with this residue.

TRY THEM OUT
So often the pudding made in the morning would be very cooling and delicious if put into the freezing pan in the electric refrigerator. Try some of the plainer puddings out in this fashion, as well as the richer ones containing whipped cream.

WARM WEATHER
Never put the butter on the table the cold water in the glasses, or remove the fruit cup or salad from the refrigerator until the last minute in warm weather. To enjoy these things they must be chilled.

MAKING FACES IS REALLY A FINE ART
"If you have an oval face, keep your hairdress simple," says a famous Hollywood makeup expert. "Don't part it too low or draw it back tightly from the forehead and face or wear bangs or dips. And if you have a widow's peak, by no means hide it."

Then, still addressing those with oval faces, the authority goes on to say that eyebrows should not be plucked or shaved or penciled in. Rouge should go in a modified triangle (not a circle) which follows the oval contour of the cheeks and be carried up lightly under the eye. Eschew cupid's bow lips. Make your lips up full and natural—not too bright.

"If you have round face," the makeup expert continues, don't wear bangs and don't slick the hair back harshly. You need softness and fullness, and the fullness should be above the ears, tapering down behind the jaw line. Wear soft, large waves, with the forehead as clear as possible.

"Don't use a light face powder because it reflects light and makes the face seem rounder. Make your mouth up delicately, but as wide as possible, since width in the lips will reduce the distance to the edge of the cheeks and make them appear more nearly oval."

The woman with an oblong face is urged to dress her hair softly and loosely, with fullness down near the chin. She never should wear a coiffure which is high on top or part in the middle. Her rouge ought to go in a carefully blended circle in the centre of the cheeks. This draws attention to width rather than length and creates an illusion of roundness in the face. With lipstick, the upper lip should be widened and the lower one made rather full at the corners. For the most part, however, natural contours should be followed and the color put on with a restrained hand.

WHY IRON PLAY SUITS
Sheets hung straight on a line, folded smoothly, and pressed under a heavy weight are almost as smooth as when ironed, and save more time still. In summer, bed linens have to be changed often, and a fresh supply always on hand is a joy indeed.

Play suits for the children, if made of mesh or cotton crepe, won't need ironing. Besides they are cool.

Curtains removed from all but the most public windows, remove the burden of caring for them. And while we are at it, let us put the heavy spreads away, too, and use the ones that don't show wrinkles. Lacking seersucker or thin prints, let us use plain white sheets to top the beds.

Soft tissue can replace handkerchiefs, paper towels the monogrammed towels that need a rest anyway, if they are to last. There is just one thing that I'd like to suggest about paper towels. If really soft ones are made, I've missed them. Remember when using them, you are supposed to blot, not rub off the moisture.

A SMALL OVEN
One housewife whose oven was small solved the problem of cooking two pies at the same time by placing a smaller tin upside down alongside of the first pie, then placing the second pie on this tin. The second pie was raised above the other one about an inch and both pies baked well without any trouble.

COCONUT LAYER CAKE
3-4 cup butter
1 1-4 cups granulated sugar
8 egg yolks, well beaten
1 1-2 cups pastry flour, sifted
4 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
3-4 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream butter and sugar until very light and fluffy. This is an important step in cake making. Add well beaten egg yolks and continue creaming. Sift flour with dry ingredients three times. Add the dry ingredients and milk alternately to the butter-sugar-egg yolk mixture. Add vanilla and continue stirring about two minutes, or approximately 300 strokes. Bake in a moderate oven in three nine-inch layer pans, greased only on the sides. Bake about 20 minutes. When cool spread toasted almond filling between the layers and cover entire cake with a white boiled frosting. Sprinkle with shredded coconut.

COCONUT CAKE
This very delicious coconut layer cake uses up most of the egg yolks left from the making of an angel food cake. The toasted almond filling heightens its appeal.

TOASTED ALMOND FILLING
1 cup granulated sugar
4 tablespoons cornstarch
1 cup water
1-2 cup orange juice
1 1-2 teaspoons grated orange rind
4 tablespoons butter
1-1/2 cup chopped toasted almonds
Mix cornstarch with sugar. Add water and cook over a low burner, stirring constantly until thick. Remove from the stove and add orange juice orange rind, and butter. Return to the stove. Blend ingredients thoroughly and heat until thickened again. Remove from the stove and cool. Add nuts and mix well.

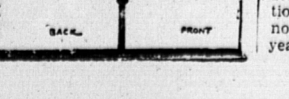

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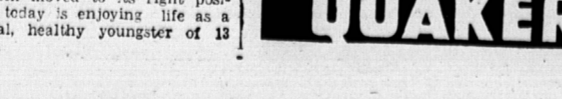
