The lecture in the First Methodist Church last evening by Rev. W. H. Smith of Summerside was rather thinly attended but those who were present were amply repaid and interested. alternate sum that they would consider sufficient. It was easy to say you did not get enough. It is harder to say how much you should have gotten. Out of a claim virtually abandoned by the Opposition we got \$30,000, and now they say we did not get enough. The Conservatives had got several nice trips out of this question, but the Province got nothing.

Hon. Mr. Gordon would like to see a table showing the loss year by year since Confederation, occasioned to this Province through want of continual communication. The memorial prepared by the Sullivan-Ferguson Administration was the ablest document ever sent out from this Legislature. Our necessities have compelled us to accept a less sum than we otherwise would.

Mr. Matheson said that the Opposition are not objecting to the receiving of the money but the form of receipt. The receipt should be on account.

Mr. Rogers wanted to know why not go back and ask for more. That would be the course outlined by the Opposition. For the partial failure to fulfill the terms of communication the Province is receiving \$1,000,000 or its equivalent.

Mr. Matheson said it was a dangerous thing to delegate gentlemen with such an important matter. He wanted to know why the names of Messrs. Rogers and McLeod were left off the second memorial. He presumed that in after years they would be claimed not guilty because they had prejudiced the case by the manner in which they compiled their figures. The representatives as a whole on the Government side agreed in favor of the Bill and those of the Opposition against it contended that \$30,000 should not be accepted in full for the non fulfillment of the terms of confederation relating to the maintenance of efficient steam communication. The leader of the Opposition moved an amendment to the effect which was lost on a straight party vote.

The Speaker then took the chair and Mr. Gordon again moved, seconded by Mr. Matheson the amendment defeated when in committee. It was lost on same division. The Opposition as a body again voted for Mr. Gordon's amendment. The bill was set down for third reading to-morrow.

Mr. Hughes presented a petition from Walter Lowe, in regard to the disputed contract on the Asylum. The petition was read and referred to a special committee of seven consisting of Messrs. McLeod, Simpson, Read, Irving, Bruce, Gordon and Matheson.

Upon motion of Hon. Mr. McLeod the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole to take into consideration a bill to alter the time of holding the October Term of the Supreme Court of Judicature in Prince Co. The bill was reported agreed to without amendments and set down for a third reading to-morrow.

Upon motion of Mr. Rogers the bill to amend the assessment of 1894 was read a first time.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**  
Captain Read moved the House into committee with Mr. Palmer in the chair to consider a bill to change the title of the Act of incorporation of the Dunk River Dairying Co. Reported agreed to without amendments and set down for third reading to-morrow.

Mr. J. A. Matheson could not allow the debate to close without offering some observations. The Premier made quite a long speech before he got down to business and in referring to last year he said he had gone before the people and boasted that he had escaped their wrath. Conflicting statements regarding the vote have been given by the Premier and Mr. Simpson and probably both are wrong. The Government are still on trial and the people in the end will give them their deserts. He hoped that the leader of the Government secured the present crew at a cheaper rate than he paid for Pineau. The full revenue under

both parties must be looked into coupled with the expenditure. He had a statement which he proposed to submit to the House.

If you come to examine you will find that the increased expense is in the multiplicity of schools. There are schools with an average attendance of few scholars. Where the small schools exist it will be found to be a poor school and poorly conducted. In order to conduct a school properly there should be a good per cent of attendance. There are 77 schools with less than 14 of an attendance and 189 with less than 20. There are some schools of course which should receive consideration, such as Boughton Island. In other cases it would be cheaper to board the children at a general school. He had visited the Land Office and found a coop in one corner where a few clerks were at work copying. In making a search it is difficult to make a find. There is not half enough room to make a successful search. The Government will find that if they expect to conduct the business of that department they will have to remodel the whole office. The Liberals have been continually pointing to the expenditure made by the Conservatives, of the receipts of the Land Office as ordinary revenue. The capital account as conducted by the Government is bogus and a fraud, the greatest in the report and that is saying a great deal.

Repairs to the Provincial building have been included in the capital account and the older the building and the more repairs the more the building will be worth as an asset. According to the intention of Government in the capital account the Provincial building is worth \$2,402,600 more than when constructed. He also found that the Hillsboro was worth \$917,500 more than when constructed. The road machines have also increased in value and are to-day \$355,000. He thought it was about time the rehasing of the borrowing of \$200,000 from capital account ceased. The Liberals said at that time to take only \$182,000 from capital account. When the bill went up to the Upper House the Liberals were in power and that being the case the Upper House was just as responsible as the Lower House.

Mr. Simpson had stated that in 1878 there was a balance in favor of the Province of \$1,000. He read a statement made by Mr. Fred. W. Hyndman which shows the indebtedness of the Province on the 1st of January 1879 to be \$51,740.

Suppose that \$200,000 was a great deal to draw from capital account by the Conservatives, yet the Liberals taxed the people \$333,000 and made a yearly expenditure of \$23,000 more than the Liberal Conservatives. He contended that according to the estimates submitted he found that the Premier intended to run the country into debt some \$26,000, the same as usual. To keep the roads in repair it will take at least \$35,000. He found in looking over the debenture account there are invested in Summerside Debentures \$4,000,000, with Charlottetown School Board \$2,200,000. There is nothing to prevent the sale of the \$12,000 added under the heading of sinking fund account. If a stranger buys the debentures of the Island he makes the purchase with
