Her inward cargo yesterday included 800 bls flour 155 bls sugar, 200 bls rolled oats and 800 pkgs sundries.

THE S. S. Coban, Holmes, arrived in port early this morning. She left Montreal Tuesday week and had a very good run down. Leaving Sydney Tuesday morning past, she ran into a blinding snow storm. This lasted an hour and during the whole time it was impossible to see a yard from the ship's side. The flakes were the largest ever seen and resembled frozen raindrops flattened out, some being six inches in circumference. Fine northerly winds were met after the storm passed right to port. She brought a full general cargo—8 head cattle, 6 horses 200 sheep, no passengers—St. John's Nfld. Herald.

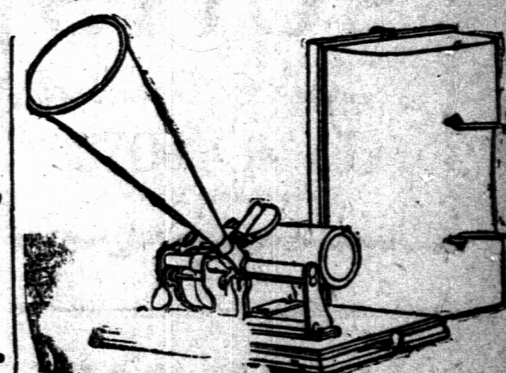
