The latest news, first of all.

Mayor Rogers, Charlottetown, was among the passengers coming to Summerside by the hockey special Friday night.

Melville Bradshaw, Summerside, left by the afternoon train Saturday to spend Sunday at his old home at New Glasgow.

Mrs. C. L. Grant returned to her home in Charlottetown Saturday after a short visit with friends in Summerside.

Trade was quite lively in Summerside Saturday. Fine clear winter weather with good ice induced a large number of people from all parts of the country round to come to town for the day's trade.

Many will be sorry to hear that Mrs. Wright, wife of Sheriff D. S. Wright, Summerside, passed away Sunday morning about 8 o'clock after an illness of only eight days. Deceased was 72 years of age. The funeral takes place tomorrow, Tuesday, at two p.m. to Searle's cemetery.

The ladies of the S.S. Methodist Church have shown their thoughtfulness of the comfort of the occupants of the parsonage lately by having a splendid new range placed in the kitchen and at the last meeting of the W. M. S. the minister's wife was presented with a certificate of life membership.

Some weeks ago a warrant was issued by Prosecutor Gough and the shop of Andrew Bowness, Kensington, was searched by Constable Geo. Brown. Eighteen bottles of whiskey were taken and samples were taken of the beer which he sold over his counter. The beer was found when tested to be twice as strong as the law permits. Mr. Bowness paid his fine. He has paid a number of fines before.

A runaway accident took place at St. Eleanor's Saturday evening, by which two young ladies had rather an unpleasant experience. A rig belonging to Austin Scalls was standing hitched in a yard and while the owner was out he gave a start to two young ladies who decided that this was their opportunity to have a free drive. After starting the horse the ladies found that he possessed considerably more speed than they expected and soon got beyond their control. While turning a sharp curve, the sleigh upset, throwing the two out, with the result that a doctor had to be called. However, at latest reports, with the exception of some bruises and a severe shaking up, they are not much the worse. The sleigh was badly broken, but the horse escaped unhurt.

ST. JOHN RIVER WATERS DIVERTED.

CALAIS, Me., Feb. 26.—The International Commission resumed this morning with Prof. Boardman of Ontario as witness. He gave an account of Chamberlain Lake, Round Pond, Second and Grand, Telos, Webster and Allegash Lakes, individually, also the combined area as 30.69 square miles. He found a natural watershed between Webster and Telos Lakes but did not survey it. By using Telos Canal an average area of 45.47 miles can be made tributary to the Penobscot. Indications were that the canal was artificial. He thought it possible to create a watershed with a depth of twenty feet by means of dykes, but questioned whether or not the plan would be practicable. They have the basin filled at least once each year. This supply would be available for use on the St. John River provided the Telos Canal were not used. Prof. Boardman said that practically nearly all the flow from Chamberlain is into Webster Lake, but thought it was possible to make it flow either way by operation of gates on existing dams. From this evidence it would appear to the average spectator that under natural conditions the greater portion of the flow from the water under discussion, would be towards the St. John River. Much of the information was brought out by Mr. Gregory's cross-examination of the witness. In the afternoon, testimony relative to the methods used in driving on the St. Croix River and the amount of water conserved in that region, was given by Irving R. Todd, manager of the Eastern Pulp Wood Company of Calais. Up to a few years ago Manager Todd told the commission all the logs on the St. Croix River were handled by the St. Croix Log Company, a mutual association of mill owners, who controlled nearly all the timber lands used. Recently, a contract for doing this work was made with the St. Croix Paper Company, which sorts the logs at Woodland, sends them down to the Baring boom and thence by rail to Milltown, where the saw mills are. The estimated annual cut of logs on the St. Croix waters, Manager Todd set at 55,000,000, of which about 30,000,000 are owned by the St. Croix Paper Company. The War, he said, is conserved in Grand, Spednic and other lakes by means of dams and in ordinary seasons, little trouble is experienced in driving operations. William A. Murchie, of the James Murchie Sons Company, of Calais, corroborated the testimony given by Mr. Todd and added that the cost of driving on the St. Croix River is about 50 cents per thousand. After hearing Prof. H. L. Boardman, of Ontario, in executive session, the commission adjourned. The commission will next sit in Bangor, about two weeks hence. Engineers will be called to estimate the probable cost of surveys to determine what volume of water may be conserved on the St. John River for the lumbermen.

The offer of arbitration by the Baltimore and Ohio, in its labor dispute made a hopeful impression of prospects for the way in which other disputes might be dealt with.

The abstract of the reports to the confederate of the currency of the National banks of the country, as of January 31st, showed the loan expansion since the November 16 report, well distributed, the New York banks being responsible for less than \$18,000,000 of the \$80,715,880 aggregate increase for that period. The stock market liquidation effected in that interval explains this relative showing. In the yearly comparison, however, there is shown an increase since February of last year of \$388,736,887 in the loan account of the National Banks, the cash reserves having shrunk in the same time over \$27,000,000. The credit condition is, in consequence, still considerably extended, in spite of the substantial deflation which has occurred in the stock market. This comparison lends importance to the reports coming from dealers in mercantile paper here in New York, of a desire to discriminate against paper not of the choicest grade. Force is given also to the suggestion that a process of liquidation on old cotton and grain paper through the country may remain to be completed.

Bonds were steady. Dealers report an improved demand for bonds. Total sales per value, \$2,692,000. United States two's, three's and four's advanced 1 per cent on call.

FIND INDICTMENTS AGAINST FOOD AND MEAT COMBINES.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—After weeks of investigation by a grand jury in Hudson county, N. J., indications are tonight that fifteen indictments will be handed up before Justice Swartz in the supreme court at Jersey City tomorrow against the packing interests of the country maintaining cold storage plants in Jersey City. Just who will be named as individual directors or officers, it is, of course, impossible to ascertain, but it is known definitely that indictments have been prepared which will charge conspiracy in restraint of trade under the New Jersey state laws. This inquiry at Jersey City has been the most important one in the east since the wave of public opinion demanded legal steps to lighten the burden of the ever-increasing higher cost of living. The great store houses there hold the food supplies upon which the millions of Greater New York and suburbs draw and New York and New Jersey have been co-operating in the investigation. A grand jury in New Jersey county is to begin a similar line of inquiry within a few days.

The plants under investigation have been those operated by the National Packing Company, Nelson, Morris & Company, Swift & Company and Armour & Company.

Pierre Garvin, the public prosecutor of Hudson county, has conducted the investigation, but has recently been balked in his efforts to obtain the books of the National Packing Company. The prosecutor threatens to obtain a court order to get possession of them and failing in this to take steps to revoke the packing company's theatre.

There was circulated today a story that men from Chicago attempted to bribe Mr. Garvin to halt the investigation. The prosecutor declined either to confirm or deny the report, but it was said that he hinted that some sort of advances were made to him.
