

Ludendorff Held Prisoner By Federals

LUDENDORFF'S SUDDEN RISE TO POWER AS DICTATOR OF BAVARIA HAS IGNOBLE ENDING

Former Commander-in-Chief of German Army Who, After Years of Plotting and Scheming, Finally Reached the Height of His Ambition only to Fall Again and is now a Prisoner in the Hands of Those Whose Office He Usurped.

MUNICH, Nov. 9.—General Erich Ludendorff today lost his second "putsch" within three years and tonight is observing the fifth anniversary of the German revolution as a prisoner in the custody of federal troops.

Government had been overthrown by the forces of general Ludendorff who had imprisoned the former premier and set himself up as dictator. The despatch referred to is as follows.

MUNICH, Nov. 9.—The Bavarian government has been declared overthrown by Adolf Hitler, Fascist leader, and the administration is in the hands of General Ludendorff as Commander-in-Chief. Dr. Von Kahr, military dictator in Bavaria had just finished addressing a patriotic manifestation in Durgbräu yesterday when Hitler entered at the head of six hundred men and announced that the Government had been overthrown and was replaced by one with General Ludendorff as supreme head and Hitler as political adviser.

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—The proclamation issued by the Government to the people regarding the Bavarian coup d'état says: "An armed band has overthrown the Bavarian government, arrested the premier Von Knilling, arrogated the right to form a Reich government, made General Ludendorff, chief of the German army and Adolf Hitler, who has only been a military adviser, its members."

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—Telephonic communication with Munich was interrupted shortly after midnight. The Minister of Defence has ordered the suppression of all news from

WELCOME BEING PREPARED FOR LLOYD GEORGE

Former War Premier Will Find New Political Situation Awaiting Him

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Lloyd-George returns to Great Britain today to find an entirely new political situation and one investing him with greater political importance and curiosity than he could possibly have foreseen when he started to tour Canada and the United States. Moreover it is the situation which may easily give him dominance to which for a long time he has been a complete stranger.

At Southampton and at London plans are prepared to give the former Premier a warm welcome, he will be given the freedom of the city of Southampton which will be made the occasion of a great gathering of his political adherents, and his progress to his Chelsea home will be in the nature of a triumphal procession. It is a bare fortnight since Premier Baldwin announced his conviction that the remedy for unemployment was a protective policy.

Protection will be fiercely fought by both Liberal and Labor parties, and both Mr. Lloyd-George and Winston Churchill are expected to be on the free trade side. The possibility of coalition between the opposing wings of the Liberal party is brought up.

BALDWIN'S DELAY SAID TO BE WEAKENING GOVERNMENT

Premier's Supporters Declare Leader is Unable to Make Decision on Most Important Point of His Policy - Election Not Probable Before Christmas.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Premier Baldwin's delay in advising His Majesty as to the exact date of dissolution of Parliament is believed to be weakening the position of the government. Many supporters of the present government are giving more or less publicity to the view that the Premier again seems unable to make up his mind on the most important point of his policy and many Conservatives, led by the Postmaster General are urging dissolution within the next ten days.

When it was first proposed that a general election be held before Christmas there was widespread opposition from tradesmen throughout the country who declared that the unsettling effect of a general election upon Christmas trade would mean the loss of many thousands of dollars to a class that has not done any too well lately and who were hoping the Christmas trade which is not unpromising would recoup them from losses of a poor summer. This protest seems to have carried weight for despite the exertion of considerable pressure it now seems unlikely that there will be an election before January. Although there is still an important body of opinion in the party which is represented in the cabinet which favors the holding of a general election at once in order that the Baldwin Government may obtain release from the pledge made by Bona Law that there would be no radical change in the fiscal policy of the country before an appeal had been made to the electorate. With this pledge dis-

posed of the government would feel free to start its campaign of education in the matter of new protection policies and relief of unemployment with which they are intimately bound up. It is considered likely that Baldwin may make an important pronouncement in his speech tonight at the Guild Hall at which the Lord Mayor's banquet. Chief political interest, however, continues to center around Lloyd George and the announcement which he is expected to make with regard to the future of his party and of Liberalism as a whole immediately after his arrival in this country.

GOVERNMENT ARRANGES FOR SURVEY OF P. E. ISLAND

With View to Ascertaining Number of Farms Available For Settlers—Hon. J. H. Myers will Represent Government at Immigration Conference in Ottawa.

Yesterday evening the members of the Stewart Cabinet held a conference with Captain Donaldson, Maritime Superintendent of the Soldiers Settlement Board. This conference was the outcome of correspondence between Premier Stewart and Major Barnett, Chairman of the Soldiers' Settlement Board for Canada with a view to having a survey made of the province to ascertain what farms may be available for immigrants. A similar survey is at present being carried on in Nova Scotia. At last night's meeting arrangements were completed for the survey and it is expected this will be completed this fall.

The government purposes establishing a Bureau of Information in connection with the Department of Agriculture, the intention being to secure all possible information with respect to available lands for colonization. The intention is to establish a system by which all this information will be kept up to date and at all times available.

REBELLIOUS BAVARIA IS A LAND OF MUSIC AND TOYS

This Isolated Community, Large as the State of Maine, Comprising About 7,000,000 People has Given to the World Many of its Noted Musical Artists.

(United Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—"One William Hohenzollern, woodchopper of Doorn, Holland, probably appreciates a certain irony in the latest despatches from Germany reporting defiance of the Berlin Government by Bavaria," says a bulletin of the National Geographic Society, which continues: "It was in a Bavarian castle hundreds of years ago that the Hohenzollern family struck root. Bavaria, the home of this family which, with Bismarck's aid, made the unified German States a world power, is now threatening to break the combination."

"This small state in the hills gave to the world the Heibels, artists, father and son, as well as the Hohenzollerns, and afforded friends and appreciation for Mozart, Wagner and Liszt. Bavaria may be described, in fact, as a land of music entirely surrounded by mountains. This wooded amphitheatre of the Alps foothills, slightly larger than the State of Maine, lies between Germany proper, Switzerland on the south and Austria on the east. It supports nearly 7,000,000 people; one-eighth of the German population. Munich, the capital, has a population larger than Pittsburg, Pa., while Nuremberg is about half as large.

"Even nature has had reservations concerning the logical direction of Bavarian loyalty. Although tributaries of the Rhine drain the southern section of the country, most of the bowl in the hills drains into the Danube and thence to the Black Sea. The Ludwigskanal, the connecting link between the North Sea and the Black Sea, runs directly across Bavarian territory.

BANDITS SHOOT UP AND LOOT KANSAS TOWN

(Canadian Press) OGDEN, Kansas, Nov. 9.—Eight or ten bandits in wild fashion held this town of five hundred inhabitants at bay for two hours yesterday while they blasted their way through the door of a vault in the Ogden State Bank. Guards stationed outside the bank kept up a heavy fire until their companies gained access to the vault and looted it. Then, shouting derisively the bandit gang shot up the town as they walked to their two motor cars on the edge of the town and drove away. Bank officials estimated the loss at twenty-six thousand dollars, including twenty-four thousand in liberty bonds. Telephone, telegraph and electric light wires were cut by the bandits before the raid.
