## Big Allied Bombers Crush Vital German War Plant

### Shift From Italian To Nazi Targets

LONDON, Aug. 18 (AP)—The big bombers of the R.A.F. and U.S. Army Air Corps, this morning switched with smooth and tremendous power from the Italian to the German theatre last night and crushed one of the Nazi war plants so thoroughly that officials estimated it could hardly be reestablished within a year.

The target for this precision attack was Peenemuende, the Nazi centre for the development of aircraft radio-location devices and armaments.

Meanwhile United States medium bombers attacked enemy airfields at Wendenrecht, Holland, and other airfields in the morning and returned without loss. They were escorted by R.A.F. Dominions and Allied Spitfires during operations which encountered "little opposition" but strong anti-aircraft fire, an air ministry spokesman said.

One enemy fighter was reported destroyed and one escorting fighter was listed as missing.

(Reports from Hungary said air raid alarms sounded in Budapest Wednesday. A Budapest dispatch recorded by United States monitors said that during an alert at night enemy aircraft were observed flying over the town.)

### May Name Leader For Invasion

LONDON, Aug. 19 (Thursday) (CP)—The London Daily Mail correspondent in Quebec, Don Iddon, said in a dispatch today that the Churchill-Roosevelt conference is studying plans for naming a commander-in-chief, probably a British, to head a direct invasion of France, which huge armies now massed in Britain will be hurled across the English Channel.

General arrangements for a "reception" of the Italian state and selection of a commander-in-chief in southern Asia, also are being studied, he said.

Iddon said his information was that Lt.-Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, United States commander in China, Burma, and India, would head the far eastern command whose responsibility would be to retake Burma and open a drive against Japan while Gen. Douglas MacArthur's push-up from the South Pacific.

Once Italy falls, the correspondent said, Britain would have only a modest use for her naval power in European waters and large numbers of British ships would be moved to the Pacific to join the American fleet.

### War Situation Last Night

QUEBEC, Aug. 18—Under the driving impetus of battle-front developments in Europe and the dynamic urge of its own joint captains, Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt, the Allied war conference here was surging toward final strategic decisions tonight.

For the key Allied strategy concepts is attrition—now that Axis air power has been out-matched quantitatively as well as qualitatively, Nazi U-boats been drastically curbed in the Atlantic and Japanese air and sea power aggressively challenged to disclose chiding strength.

It was the time factor also, that heavily underscored renewed critical Russian press comment on Allied strategy at this crucial stage of the fight.

Yet these causal Russian comments coincided with a tremendous and widening Allied air offensive, battering at continental invasion gateways along the whole reach of the Mediterranean and of the channel coast.

In answer to Red Star's call for an Allied invasion thrust in the west—to force withdrawal of 60 or more German divisions from the Russian front—it can be pointed out that either Washington nor London had any definite foreknowledge of the Russian summer offensive until it was in full swing only weeks ago.

### British 8th And U.S. 7th Armies Ready

LONDON, Aug. 18 (CP)—The people of occupied Europe were told in an Algiers broadcast tonight to begin preparations for an Allied invasion at a time and place to be announced.

The Algiers radio is under Allied control. The broadcast said that following the Sicilian campaign, the next phase, the liberation of occupied countries, had begun.

"We are obviously not going to reveal where the next blow will fall," the broadcast continued, adding that it was obvious the people of occupied countries would be the first to welcome armies of liberation.

The message especially directed the French people not to show premature signs of action. The announcer ended his broadcast by saying that his message was from the Allied High Command and that while previous messages had been sent from London this one should be considered as of the same importance.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 18 (AP)—Two super armies in Sicily—the British 8th and the American 7th, are "ready to go at any minute" in bold offensives, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared today, reporting that British and American troops had killed 167,000 men, wounded 167,000 men and captured on the island up to Aug. 10.

As the Allied commander-in-chief disclosed the magnitude of Axis casualties, artillery duels thundered over the Messina Strait and Allied planes hunted enemy remnants, retreating by sea and over broken roads up the Italian mainland.

### News Briefs

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, Aug. 19 (Thursday) (AP)—Returning to the scene of devastation at Wewak, New Guinea, Allied planes on Wednesday finished off all but 10 of the 225 enemy aircraft which had been sighted and attacked there Tuesday and shot down 28 of the 30 interceptors, the High Command announced.

LONDON, Aug. 18 (CP)—The arrival of Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden in Quebec today to attend the Allied war strategy conference was regarded in London as timed to coincide with deliberations on the Italian proposal to make Rome an open city.

LONDON, Aug. 18 (CP)—Russian troops striking across the Dnieper River today captured Zmiev, 20 miles south of Kharkov in a decisive assault that killed 1,200 Germans and threatened to cut one of the last railroads feeding that beleaguered Ukraine base, Moscow disclosed tonight.

BERNE, Aug. 18 (AP)—Indications here are that Germany is going to fight a delaying action from southern Sicily northward, will do her best to keep Italy in the war, and will make a bitter, determined stand at the Brenner Pass in the north.

### Conference In Full Swing At Quebec

QUEBEC, Aug. 18 (CP)—Augmented by the air arrival of two British ministers, the Churchill-Roosevelt conference to plan the military destruction of the Axis and economic formulae for the peace got into full swing at the Citadel here today.

St. Hon. Anthony Eden and Rt. Hon. Brendan Bracken, Prime Minister Churchill's ministers of foreign affairs and information, arrived early this afternoon direct by British clipper-type plane from Foynes, Eire.

They went at once to the Citadel to present themselves to their chief. It is expected Cordell Hull, United States Secretary of State, will join President Roosevelt here today.

### Smash All Canadian Shipbuilding Records

MONTREAL, Aug. 18 (CP)—Three 10,000-ton freighters, expected to be one of the most colorful of its kind in Canada, on hand to send the ships on their way will be a band of Iroquois Indians from nearby Caughnawaga, in full battle dress and war paint. ### New Canadian Tribal Destroyer

OTTAWA, Aug. 18 (CP)—The third of Canada's British-built Tribal Class destroyers, H.M.C.S. Huron, has gone into service. It was announced tonight at naval headquarters.

Equipped with the latest devices proven and tested in the British Navy, the Huron is said to carry "even greater armament" than the two previous Tribals which have been in service for some time, the Iroquois and the Athabaskan.

### Premier King Entertains Visiting Leaders At Dinner
