RECORD MOTOR TRAFFIC — The combined number of trucks and autos transported by the S.S. "Charles Dunning" and the S.S. "Prince Nova" at Wood Islands reached an all time high for the month of May this season. The passenger traffic during the month amounted to 5,028, the number of autos transported 1223 and the number of trucks transferred 624.

BRANT REPAIRS PROGRESSING — The E. "Brant" which has been undergoing repairs for the past two weeks will soon be ready to resume duties again, it was learned yesterday afternoon. The E. "Brant" arrived at Buntain and Bells wharf yesterday afternoon with a shipment of canned lobsters. GASOLINE PRICE INCREASE — A one half cent increase in the wholesale price of gasoline in the Maritimes is announced by Imperial Oil Ltd. effective June first. A company official said the adjustment reflects a similar increase in the United States Gulf and Eastern seaboard prices, and brings Maritime gasoline prices nearer to normal relationship with crude oil costs and prices of other petroleum products.
