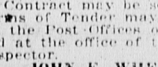

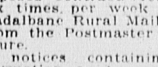

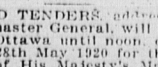

Will it damage the Ford coils to connect this lighting current to them, for starting purposes, in the same way that dry cells are used? Can I reduce the current by resistance and, if not, how can I reduce it?

MOTOR SCHOONER IS ABANDONED BECAUSE OF FIRE
