THE CITY LIGHTING.

Five members of the City Council voted at the recent meeting to refuse the lower tender of the Full Electric Co. and to continue the contract for city lighting with the P. E. Island Electric Company, represented in this city by Mr. James Waddell. This action of the five Councillors, Messrs. Whear, Macdonald, Brown, Balls, and Taylor was so extraordinary, especially when taken in connection with the delay in calling for tenders, and the longer delay in getting the specifications ready, that it gave to many persons the impression that the Councillors named were from some reason disposed to unduly favor Mr. Waddell's company at the expense of the City.

Everything therefore that will throw light upon the relations between any of the Councillors named and either of the rival lighting companies becomes a matter of public interest. As already stated, rumor has been busy with these matters, and the public are entitled to such information as can be obtained. For instance, we have it on the authority of one of the Directors of the Full Electric Company, that Coun. Balls told him that Mr. Waddell, of the P. E. I. Electric Company had sent him his bill for lighting his (Mr. Ball's) shop at greatly reduced figures, without being asked to do so.

Another Councillor who voted to continue the contract with the P. E. Island Electric Company, had notified the Full Company on 1st June that he would not require their light after that day, and his premises were lighted on the following evening by the P. E. Island Electric Company. One of the Directors of the Full Company is our authority for the statement that the Councillor referred to in this paragraph informed this director that he had made a very low contract with the P. E. Island Electric Company for a term of five years, with a privilege of extension to ten years.

The position of Councillor A. Macdonald in regard to the matter will be made quite apparent by the two letters from him to the Full Electric Company, copies of which are subjoined:

CHARLOTTETOWN, March, 23.

Sec'y-Treas. Full Electric Light Co., City.
DEAR SIR:—Re my contract with Waddell for light supply, I may say, that I pay quarterly \$17 or \$33 per year. My present quarter ends March 31st, which will scarcely give sufficient time to make connections with my house and store. Everything can be in readiness for taking me on July the 1st.

It will be observed that at this time, Coun. Macdonald was a shareholder in the Full Electric Co. and this Company was not only desirous but hopeful of obtaining a contract to do his lighting. But Mr. Macdonald appears to have changed his mind after his letter of March 23, and no doubt for the reason stated as below:

Charlottetown, May 23, 1900.

Sec'y. Full Electric Co.
DEAR SIR:—Re discontinuing Royal and taking on Full Light, I have concluded to let matters remain as they now are, Waddell having offered me prices with which it would be impossible for your Company to compete without sustaining loss.

Here we have the statement of Coun. Macdonald that he had been offered terms for lighting with which it would be impossible for the Full Company to compete without sustaining loss. Is it not a fair inference that Coun. Macdonald is now receiving his light at less than cost, and was so receiving it when he voted to extend the City contract with Mr. Waddell? Coun. Macdonald gets cheap light and the city dear light from the same source. What relation does the private contract sustain to the city contract, in the case of Mr. Macdonald, and of other Councillors

as well? And what does His Worship Mayor, as head of the Council, think of this matter? This is hardly a time when silence is golden on the part of our Chief Magistrate. Above all, what do our citizens think?

A cable despatch quotes the London Daily Mail as authority for the statement that Lord Roberts has been appointed to succeed Lord Wolseley as Commander in Chief. It has been known for some time that Lord Wolseley's health has been failing, and that the outlook for his recovery is not good. This probably accounts for the new appointment, if it has been made. There could be no better choice. Lord Roberts was born in September, 1832 and Lord Wolseley the following June of 1833, so there is comparatively little difference in the ages of the commanders, both of whom are veterans.

The strength of the resistance offered by the Chinese Army, and its artillery and small arms have been found to be so much more effective than in previous wars as to excite astonishment. The London Engineer points out the reason. At Kian Nan, near Shanghai, China has had since 1870 a huge arsenal, which has been more recently equipped for the manufacture of magazine rifles, rapid fire guns of small calibre and heavy ordnance up to a 12-inch bore. These works, recently employed 2,500 men and were under the direction of skilled Europeans. A number of 12-inch guns of the Armstrong pattern have been constructed there within the past ten years. The Allied forces are learning by bitter experience that the magazine rifle and the machine gun in the hands of the Chinese are great levellers of the vaunted superiority of Europeans over Orientals.
