CONVALESCING—Gunner Stewart Moore, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Moore of this city, while serving at the front in the 12th Siege Battery, recently contracted trench fever. While being conveyed on a stretcher along the line to the base hospital, this gallant young soldier unfortunately had both feet frost-bitten. He is now in the 4th Canadian General Hospital at Basingstoke, England. The latest word from him is that he is steadily improving and hopes soon to rejoin his battery. The many friends and acquaintances of Gunner Moore in his native province will hope that he will soon be completely restored to his usual health.

KILLED IN ACTION.—Private Robert McInnis, son of Mrs. Jessie MacInnis and the late Hector MacInnis, of Bradalbane, P. E. I., formerly of Brackley Point, was killed in action Sept. 24th, 1918. Private MacInnis, enlisted in the U. S. Army Co. M. 103rd Infantry, March 1917 and went overseas to France, Sept. 1917. He leaves besides his mother, four sisters, Mrs. James McSwain, of Bradalbane, and the Misses Florence, Annie and Jessie MacInnis, nurses in Boston, also two brothers Fredrick, and Charles, of Charlottetown, and John William, who is in the U. S. Army, in France. Another brother Richard Alden, died very suddenly of influenza Oct. 23rd, 1918, at his home in Ebenezer, P. E. I., leaving his widow and three children.
