PARKS STILL PROTESTING REPLAYED GAME

HALIFAX, Sept. 19.—(C.P.)—The dispute between Halifax Willow Parks and Yarmouth Gateways over the right to meet Springhill Fence Busters in the final round of the Nova Scotia senior baseball championships is still raging fiercely, although the first game of the series between Yarmouth and Springhill was scheduled for today.

The dispute arose when Halifax claimed interference in the fourth inning of the final game in the semi-finals against Yarmouth. The protest was carried to the Nova Scotia Baseball Association, but was rejected. Tonight Thomas L. MacDonald, President of the Maritime Provinces Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada wired Secretary Treasurer C. D. Shipley, of Amherst, requesting him to call a meeting of the executive at Amherst to settle the dispute between the rival semi-finalists.
