RUSSIANS TO GET SOME SUBMARINES

Three En Route from France to Vladivostok— Cruiser Novik Pursued far North and Run Ashore—Consuls at Shanghai Dealing with Disarmament of Russian Warships There.

RUSSIANS GETTING SUBMARINES.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—(Special).—Three French submarine boats have been forwarded by rail to Vladivostok.

ANOTHER CHINESE REPORT.

Chinese reports say the Japanese captured one important Russian fort at Port Arthur but could not hold it in face of heavy artillery fire.

THE QUESTION OF DISARMAMENT.

The foreign consuls at Shanghai met to consider action relative to the Russian vessels there. It is believed they will take measures to protect Chinese neutrality and compel the disarmament of the Russian ships.

NO FRESH FIGHTING NEWS.

There is no fresh news of fighting at Port Arthur or near Liao Yang.

THE NOVIK VANQUISHED.

TOKIO, Aug. 22.—After a severe engage-

ment with the protected cruisers Chitose and Tsushima, galleons of the Japanese cruiser fleet, the Russian cruiser Novik was vanquished in the fight which occurred Sunday.

AFTERWARD BAN ASHORE.

Afterward the Novik in a sinking condition was run ashore in Korakotisk harbor on the Island of Saghalien.

[The Novik was a small Russian cruiser of 3,200 tons, 16½ knots speed, carrying eight 8 in and ten 6 inch guns and 315 men. The Japanese cruiser which fought her were of 4,700 and 3,420 tons respectively and of 23½ and 20 knots speed. It is no worthy that the Novik ran a harem rather than submit to capture. She is a Russian island lying north of Yez, the most northern of the larger Japanese islands. Its nearest port is about 5.0 miles northeast of Vladivostok.

THE SATURDAY NIGHT STORM

Schooner Senator Snowball Towed into this Port

Total Wreck of Schooner Pleiades on St. Peter's Island—Captain and Crew Bravely Rescued.

Besides the Margaret Ann wrecked on Governor's Island there were other vessels in trouble on last night in the storm of Saturday night. One of these was the schooner Senator Snowball from Chatham for Charlottetown which was picked up by the S. S. Bonavista and towed into this port yesterday morning. She had her mainmast broken off at the deck, lost her mainsail and all her main rigging. The vessel is owned by the Miramichi Pilot Club.

The schooner Pleiades, owned and commanded by Capt. Robert McInnis of Chatham, was totally wrecked on St. Peter's Island at 2 o'clock on Sunday morning. She had a cargo of stone for Charlottetown streets brought from Pictou. The crew were rescued with difficulty by Captain Taylor, the lighthouse keeper and four assistants after two hours hard work, using the schooner's boat, which had drifted ashore. They threw a line from the bank to the schooner. Another line was made fast to the boat and the four shipwrecked men were thus taken ashore, climbing up the bank which was 40 feet high, by means of a rope. The rescued men were taken to the home of William Taylor where they were well looked after. Yesterday they were engaged in stripping the vessel of her sails and rigging. On board the schooner with Captain McInnis were Norman McInnis, mate; Kenneth Oxley of Wallace, N. S., and a passenger Harry McLeod of Springton, P. E. I., a student of Dalhousie College.

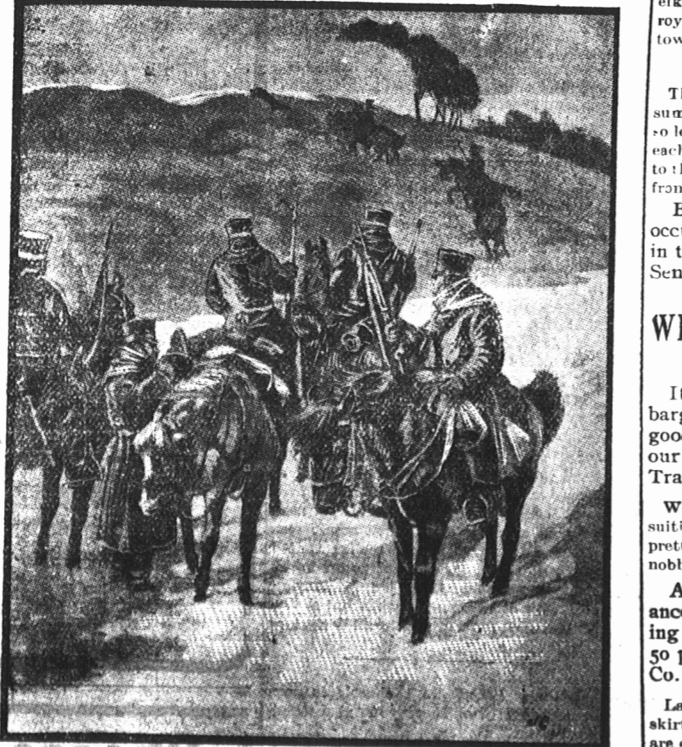
