Some idea of the remoteness of Dr. Young's present situation can be gathered from the fact that the nearest post office to which he has access it takes five days to reach. The writer, who is more than usually adventurous, states that he has "just got in from Kerki, where no foreigners ever stood." He took some chances to get there, "but he got there O.K."

HORSES RUNNING.—The Horse races which will be held on June 3rd, should prove an immense success, as all the classes have been exceptionally filled. "Dr. Sharper, 2:19, will be a certain starter in the 2:19 class, excepting accidents of course. He was worked out on the track on Monday and showed splendid form. His owners have sent away for new "rigging" for him and it should arrive here before the day of the races. The presence of Leroy and the little Ontario mare Miss Aleyone should tend to make that event very exciting, while the 2:24 trot has a formidable field of starters. It is fully believed that these races will be among the best ever held on a local track.

P. E. I. students figure in the graduating and prize lists of both the Acadia (Wolfville) and Mount Allison (Sackville) Ladies' Seminaries, the closing exercises of which have just been held.

The report of the Acadia Seminary shows a total registration of 325. The work of the year was done efficiently. Discipline was well maintained and self-government was assumed by the senior class. The religious life was quickened. A number united with the church, the result of Rev. P. J. Stackhouse's services.

The conservatory of music had seven teachers, 136 pupils in pianoforte alone; 71 in voice; 24 in violin; six in organ.

Among the graduates from the Wolfville Seminary was Miss Annie M. McKinnon, of Charlottetown, who graduated in the Vocal Course. In the prize list is twice mentioned Miss Hazel Morse, of Bedeque, who took first in the G. P. Payzant Prizes, and first also in the Amherst Alumnae Prizes, for the highest standing in the English Bible.

At the Mt. Allison Academy, the chief of the institutions at Sackville, Dr. Palmer, Principal, in making his report reviewed briefly the work of the past twenty years, the time that he has been Principal of the Academy. When he took charge the institution was under a heavy burden of debt and the number in the residence was twenty. Now the Academy, though many improvements and additions had been made, was free of debt and last year seventy-four were in residence. The enrollment last year was 154. Good and faithful work had been done and the future looks bright. Dr. Palmer pointed out the urgent need of more essential and class room accommodation, and hoped that within a short time an annex could be built to meet these needs.

Mr. John M. Hensley, of Summerside, was one of the students matriculating.

As to the Mt. A. Ladies' College, Rev. Dr. Campbell in making his report for the year said that taking into consideration the number of students, their average academic standing, their school spirit, and appreciation of high standards, the year ranks among the best in the history of Mount Allison.

Among the graduates in music from this Academy was Miss Ray Ferguson, of Souris (violin), while Miss Lillian Fletcher, of Charlottetown, wins one of the Pickup prizes for the third highest average in the year's studies; Miss Annie Metherall, of Summerside, wins the first of the class essay prizes for second-year students; Miss Nan Brown, of Charlottetown, wins the Latin Grammar prize; while Miss Bertha Rattenbury, of Charlottetown, also, gains a certificate in the course in English.

The class of 1908 prize at Acadia was won by Mr. Alden B. Dawson, of Uigg.

SAFE ARRIVAL.—Dr. Strickland, acting U.S. Consul at Charlottetown has received a letter from former Consul Wesley Frost dated at Cork, May 16th, announcing the safe arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Frost in Ireland. They had a splendid trip and are delighted with the new surroundings. Dr. Strickland has not yet received any definite information as to when Mr. Frost's successor at Charlottetown, Mr. Hamilton Mayes of Columbia, Tennessee, will arrive here.

PARTS OF WRECK.—The S. S. Brant on Wednesday night arrived in Charlottetown with the spars, masts and other parts of the ill-fated schooner "Alana." The steamer worked hard at the wreck and succeeded in pulling up both the heavy booms together with a large portion of the sails. The dory was also raised. The wreck now lies in eight fathoms of water at low tide, but is no obstruction to navigation as she is resting on a soft mud bottom. No signs of the three other men who were drowned were seen.

HONOR FOR CANON SIMPSON.—The Chancellor of the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, P. Q., has invited the Rev. Canon Simpson, of this city, to attend the convocation of that university which is to be held on June 18th, when it is proposed to confer upon the Canon the degree of D. C. L. (honoris causa). Canon Simpson graduated in Artium of that university which is to be attained his Master's degree in 1879. The Guardian desires to join with his many friends and parishioners in congratulating him upon the honor for which he has been selected.

PRESENTATION.—The most striking incident in connection with the recent convocation of Mount Allison University was the presentation of an address to Dr. R. C. Weldon, late dean of the law school of Dalhousie, on the occasion of his retirement from his life-work. The presentation was made by Lieutenant-Governor Wood, of New Brunswick, one of the earliest graduates of the University, an old and warm friend of Dr. Weldon. Dr. David Allison, who was president of the university when Dr. Weldon was a professor on its staff, and Dr. A. D. Smith, one of his colleagues in those years, spoke in warm words of praise. Mount Allison is Dr. Weldon's alma mater.
