AMSTERDAM, Sept. 6.—“We have everything to lose by a big enemy advance, while if we advance our enemy's loss will be comparatively little because they always have the open sea behind them, dominated by the Allies,” declares Captain Salzmann, military writer of the Vossische Zeitung. “We cannot give in. We must continue to fight. If we had Foch's inexhaustible human material, we long ago not only would have been in Paris but would have spread over the entire world.”

—NORTH BEDEQUE RED CROSS  
—The Annual meeting of the North Bedeque Red Cross Society was held in the Hall on Thursday evening, Aug. 15. The attendance was large. The president, Mrs. A. Laird outlined the work of the year. The treasurer, Miss Jessie MacCaull reported that \$419.15 had been raised during the year and \$291.37 expended, leaving a balance on hand of \$127.78. This report evoked considerable enthusiasm. The Society covers very little more than the North Bedeque School District and its contributing families number only 27, so that the average contributions per family was about \$15 each. Besides this, contributions in cash and socks were made by members of the North Bedeque Red Cross Society to the Red Cross Society of Summerside. Since the Society was organized in 1914, a total of \$1279.19 has been paid in by its members and sent overseas, either in cash or in comforts of one form or another, making an average contribution of \$47.38 per family. The Secretary reported 18 meetings during the year and the following supplies made up:—160 pairs socks, 15 pairs mitts, 1 pair gloves, 72 Hannel shirts, all of which were forwarded to the boys overseas. In addition to this, Xmas parcels were made up and forwarded of which no account was kept. The following officers were elected: Mrs. Robert Baker, President, Mrs. Archibald Stavert, Vice-president, Miss Jessie MacCaull, Treasurer, Miss Jessie Clark, Secretary.
