To Hunt Booze by Air and on Sea

Alberton

NEW YORK, March 18.—An airplane squadron and a fleet of subchasers are soon to be sent here to wage war against the smuggling of liquor into the port of New York. Ralph A. Day, State prohibition director, upon his return today from a trip to Washington announced that a conference with commissioning officers had been held for a vigorous campaign by air and water which will be carried on under Director Day's supervision.

The director said he could not yet say how many planes and subchasers the government would use in the effort to stop the flow of liquor by sea, which is now recognized as New York's chief means of illicit supply. The base from which the fleet will operate will be kept secret for the present.

Mr. Day said the prohibition department had been assured full cooperation by the Coast Guard service and Customs officials. The ships are to be heavily armed and will be manned by former army men.

Lords Debate Irish Treaty

LONDON, March 17.—Debate on the Irish Free State treaty was resumed in the House of Lords today. There have been persistent reports that the "Die-Hards" would seek to destroy the treaty by amendments, but the tone of today's debate gave little indication of such tactics.

Dissatisfied With Report of Dr. Prince

LONDON, England, March 18.—Dissatisfaction with the published report of Dr. Prince following his investigation of the mysterious deaths at the MacDonald homestead in Nova Scotia, is expressed, today, by Dr. Francis L. Watts, F. T. S., R. C. P., London, psychologist. Dr. Watts says that Dr. Prince most certainly failed, and that he would like to have the chance the "New Yorker" had to visit the Antigonish locality for a few days.

Advances Theories.

His own theories regarding the unsolvable Riddell case, he advances a couple of new ideas. He thinks that wireless currents may have something to do with their spooks and their fires, but also believes someone in the MacDonald family may have been under hypnotic influence while performing some of "occult" manifestations. He also advances the idea that some spirits, which have long since left their bodies, have the power of maintaining an earthly manifestation, and are able to convey the impression of a feeling of flesh against the bodies of mortals. This, he points out, would explain the "shades" felt by the reporter from Halifax while sleeping in the MacDonald house. He adds that such manifestations are very rare.

FRAUDULENT FEEDING STUFFS

In administering the Feeding Stuffs Act the Seed Commissioner at Ottawa has made the discovery that many commercial stock feeds are adulterated with worthless substances which give only bulk and weight. A product sold as barley meal at \$4 a bag, was found by microscopic examination to contain no barley whatever. The material consisted of a mixture of ground corn, oatmeal, bran meal and ground oat hulls. This mixture had the merit of containing some nutritive value. Another mixture sold as ground oat cake however, was much less valuable inasmuch as it consisted to a large extent of ground oat hulls, which is a very indigestible product, together with a little linseed meal and barley flour. These discoveries unfortunately shatter confidence in feed mixtures in general, many of which are sound and good. They go to prove, however, the necessity for a careful enforcement of the Feeding Stuffs Act. Arrangements have been made by the Seed Commissioner for the examination of samples of feeds purchased by farmers where there is reason to believe that misrepresentation or fraud has been practised.
