At the same time the Russian Emperor expresses the belief that a means will be found to maintain peace.

EQUAL-SUFFRAGE BAND STILL PLODDING ON

PHILADELPHIA, February 16.—Enthusiastic crowds greeted the survivors of the little band of suffragette who arrived here early tonight from New York to Washington. Footsore and streaked with dust of Jersey roads, the eight women, under command of "General" Rosalie Jones, marched up Market street to the local suffragette headquarters in a lane cleared by a police escort. Hundreds of sympathizers met the "army" on the road between Burlington and Camden and escorted them here. Today's hike started promptly at nine o'clock this morning for Burlington, N. J., seventeen miles away.

HUDSON BAY OPEN IN JANUARY.

MONTREAL, Feb. 15.—"Port Nelson open in January," seems a good vote for the all-year-round navigation of Hudson Bay. Although H. T. Hazen's report, re Nelson as a port, is still in the hands of Hon. Frank Cochrane, it is learned that when Mr. Hazen left Nelson in the month of January the bay was then absolutely open and the only ice appearing along the shores.

The promoters of the North Railway Co. here declare that navigation on the bay from Nelson to Nattawa, the foot of James Bay, will be open practically all the year round with the proper kind of vessels.

NORWEGIAN SHATTERS SKI-LEAPING RECORD.

IRONWOOD, Mich., February 16.—Ragner Omtved, of Chicago, the Norwegian student who came to this country a year ago to compete for the amateur championship in ski jumping, today broke the world's record, jumping as a professional. Omtved cleared 169 feet, beating by 13 feet the former world's record of 156 feet made in Norway. Forty other contestants and a large crowd of enthusiasts witnessed the tremendous leap, which was made in the last day of the tournament of the American Ski association here.

AUTO BANDIT CONFESSES TO KILLING POLICEMAN

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—Robert Webb, highwayman, and leader of the automobile bandits, confessed that he shot and killed policeman Peter Hart several weeks ago. Webb was captured and made to state attorney Hoyne, after forty-eight hours of stubborn denial by Webb.

TWO HIP SING TONG SENTENCED TO DEATH

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Two members of the Chinese Hip Sing Tong, named Eng Hing and Yee Dock, today were sentenced to execution, during the week beginning March 24, for the murder of Lee Kay, a fellow countryman, during a tong shooting here a year ago. The principal witnesses against them were two Philadelphia girls, who had left their homes and drifted into Chinatown.

NEW CANCER DISCOVERIES.

BERLIN, Feb. 16.—The results of experiments to find the origin of cancer are published today by Professor Johannes Fibigre, director of the Pathological Institute at Copenhagen in the Clinical Weekly. These show cancerous growths in the esophagus and stomachs of rodents, due to the presence of worms in the alimentary tract, an indeterminate number of which are from the common kitchen cockroach.

Professor Fibigre succeeded in producing cancer by feeding the parasite eggs of cockroaches to rats. The experiments are considered as being of great importance to seekers for a cure of cancer as they form the first experimental production of the disease.

CANADIAN PROTEST AGAINST AMERICAN LITERARY TEST.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Protests from Canadian sources have been received against the "literary test," feature of the immigration bill, vetoed by President Taft yesterday. Canadian railroad officials claim that it would hamper traffic across the Canadian border and that its administration would bring about much inconvenience to travellers.
