Inspection By Commander Of 1st Division

A distinguished visitor to Charlottetown yesterday was Major-General A. G. L. McNaughton, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., Inspector-General of units of the 1st Division Canadian Active Service Force. General McNaughton arrived by plane at 9:45 a. m. and left for Ottawa 10:30, after inspecting the 2nd and 8th Medium Batteries, C.A.S.F. at Beach Grove Inn. He was accompanied by Colonel E. W. Sanson, D.S.O., Director of Military Training, Ottawa, and Colonel C. B. Price, D.S.O., Montreal. His visit, General McNaughton said, was chiefly to see after the comfort of the troops enlisted for overseas. He expressed satisfaction with the quarters obtained for the artillerymen, and seemed quite pleased with their turnout on inspection.

This was General McNaughton's second visit to Charlottetown. On the former occasion some years ago he addressed the Army and Navy Club.

Fine War Record

Born at Moosemin, Sask., General McNaughton is 52 years of age. At the outbreak of the First Great War, he organized the 4th Battery, Canadian Field Artillery. This battery formed part of the 2nd C.F.A. Brigade of the First Canadian Division. He was wounded at the second Battle of Ypres in April, 1915, but returned to France, commanded the 31st Howitzer Battery of the Second Canadian Division. Promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel in March, 1916, he took over the 11th Brigade, C.F.A., of the 3rd Canadian Division, and commanded it through the battle of Arras and until February 1917, when he was appointed counter-battery staff officer of the Canadian Corps.

Except for one month's leave of absence while recovering from wounds, General McNaughton continued to carry out his duties until October, 1918, when he became General Officer Commanding the Canadian Corps Heavy Artillery.

Peace-Time Service

On his return to Canada he was appointed member of the committee for reorganization of Canada's military forces. He became Director of Military Training on January 1, 1920, and Deputy Chief of the General Staff three years later. In the interval he had passed the Staff College at Camberley, England.

When the Imperial Defence College was instituted in 1927, General McNaughton was selected as the first representative for Canada. On returning to this country he was appointed officer commanding Military District No. 11 in British Columbia.

Then in 1929 he was appointed to the highest military office in Canada and served four years as Chief of the General Staff. In 1933 he was given an extension and his appointment as President of the National Research Council followed in 1935.

His recent appointment to the command of the Canadian Active Service Force was learned with general satisfaction throughout Canada.

Jolson said that since the separation he had offered her \$400 a week for life, with a lump settlement of \$50,000 if she married again, and a \$100,000 trust fund for their adopted child. She rejected this as insufficient, he said.

Mackenzie King Will Speak On Canada's War Aims

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Prime Minister Mackenzie King will speak from Ottawa over the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation Friday night from 9:30 to 10 p. m. EST (10:30 to 11 p. m. AST) on "Canada's war aims."

This speech will be followed "very shortly" by another broadcast by Mr. Mackenzie King entitled "Canada's war efforts" the date and time for this speech has not been fixed yet.

These speeches probably will be the first of a series by cabinet ministers. It is understood that the Prime Minister planned to make radio addresses earlier on these topics but deferred them because he did not want to appear to be entering the Quebec election campaign.

And now, "Bill," as she is known to southern Albertans, wouldn't trade her job for any other, unless, maybe, "if I could drive a big truck." She would like to drive an ambulance during the war, too, "as I'd like to do something to help and that is the kind of work I can do best." Four years ago when her father, an automobile tradesman, needed someone to take charge of the ser-

vice station section and to keep an eye on things in general, he decided that his daughter "Bill" knew more about the trade than anyone else around Nanton. SILVER THIMBLES EQUIP HOSPITALS

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(CP)—The Silver Thimble Fund, which raised more than 60,000 pounds (about \$294,000) during the First Great War, is to be started once more by the founder, Mrs. H.E. Hope-Clarke of Wimbledon. Mrs. Hope-Clarke conceived the idea for the fund one July day in 1915 when she pushed her finger through the top of an old silver thimble and pricked herself while sewing. This led to a movement for collection of all the worn-out silver thimbles, forgotten trinkets and other odds and ends that could be melted down and turned into money.
